His breeleny is glad to find that they are so ready to afrist in road making and other local improvements. He is persuaded that their liberally in this respect will redomned to their advantage and Islalle communicate with you more fully on the subject at an early date.

Will regard to the fisheries you will please to inform themselfovernment cumob in justice refuse to earry out the agreement which was onlived nito with certain parties in 1849 at the instance of the Indians themselves, unless those parties fail to fulfil the stipulations of the base; they may be reminded however that although the islands become temporarily the property of the Lepses their night to fish in the adjacent waters remains uninfaired.
