With reference to the case of Mrs Mary Hare, who has it would appear shared in distributions made to two bands, I beg to say that if after careful examination of the paylists you find that she was by birth a member of the West Bay Band and afterwards became a member of the Maganet tewan Band, you should strike her name off the West Bay Band pay-list and also off the Robinson Treaty annuity pay-list, as members of the West Bay Bar Band are not entitled to draw Robinson Treaty annuity. If the woman was originally a member of the Maganettewan Band, and was transferred to the West Bay Band, with the permission of the Department, her name should be removed from the Maganettewan pay-list, and should be paid interest money with the West Bay Band, and also be paid Robinson Treaty annuity, as al 1 members of the Maganettewan Bank are entitled to participate in the distributions of Robinson Treaty annuity.

The above ruling applies in all similar cases, affecting persons who originally belonged to bands entitled to receive Robinson Treaty annuity, or who did not by birth belong to buch bands but were afterwards transferred thereto.
