TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—Tenders have just been taken on consumptive sanitarium on Buttonwood farm.—Charles Proctor will erect a pair of residences on Pacific avenue, and William Maher a pair on Ontario street.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—Flavelle & McLaughlin, of Lindsay, Ont., are reported as arranging for a site for a large flour mill here.—An agreement has been reached between the town council and the C.P.R. officials. Plans for new power house have been decided upon. It will be designed to generate 3,000 horse power, and in addition the company will install fire alarm system throughout the works. The new passenger station will be built next year.

STRATFORD, ONT.—The Board of Works have decided to construct a new septic tank. The contract for concrete work will be awarded this week.—This week a local syndicate will commence the erection of 25 brick houses.—Orr & Russell, architects, have completed plans for a double house to be built by Mrs. J. F. Sholz, 40 x 37 feet, three-storers, red brick, hot air heating, gas lighting.—R. B. Barber, architect, has prepared plans for a new residence on William street for J. L. Bradshaw, two-storers and finished attic, red brick, combination hot water and air heating, with both electric and gas lighting, cost about \$3,200.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Numerous subscriptions are being received towards the Y. M. C. A. building fund.—Dalton & Eveleigh, architects, have taken tenders on a car bar for the British Columbia Electric Railway Company.—The Vancouver Brewery Co. contemplate making extensive alterations and additions to the brewery on 9th avenue, Mount Pleasant, for which tenders will shortly be invited. New boilers and machinery and a 20-ton ice-making plant will be installed.—Martin & Robertson, wholesale commission agents, purpose adding two-storers to their warehouse.—C. R.
