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WELLMAN'S AIRSHIP DASH FOR THE POLE ABANDONED

Weather Said To Be the Reason

Explorer and Party Will Return Soon—May Try Again Next Year.

THOMSON, Norway, Sept. 9.—According to Captain Isachsen, in command of the Norwegian Arctic expedition which arrived today from the north, Walter Wellman and his party, of the Chicago Record-Headline expedition, will probably return here at the end of the present month, abandoning their plans to attempt to reach the pole in an airship for the present year.

No start had been attempted up to August 28, and the weather subsequent to that date precluded an ascent of the airship, neither winds, fog and snow prevailing.

Wellman's airship, in which he was to make the attempt to reach the North Pole from Spitzbergen, is the finest dirigible balloon ever constructed. It is 125 feet long and is driven by three motors developing seventy horse power.


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WALTER WELLMAN AT THE HELM OF HIS AIRSHIP AMERICA.
