



Lost The Kind You Have Always Bought Bears the Signature of har At Flitching PHILADELPHIA, May 1.-Accom-panied by a heavy rain and hail, a violent wind storm swept over the

northern section of this city this af-ternoon, causing considerable damage. No lives were lost and no one was injured. More than a dozen houses were unroofed. At Girard College three electric light towers, each 125 feet high, were blown down. The storm came suddenly from the west, moved rapidly across the northern section of the city in New Jersey. It lasted about ten minutes. This was not felt to any extent in the centre of the city except for a heavy fall of rain.


