(Continued from page 1) ing with the Government which is already convicted of treachery, but the views of the moderates, as voiced by the papers are divergent.

Moderate Unionists fear that Home Rule will be on the Statute Books within a month, if no settlement by mutual consent can be made and although the act is isoperative until next year, it would be hard to repeal, unless the Unionists are returned by an overwhelming majority at the general election.

Moderate Liberals fear that bloodshed will occur unless larger concessions are made and foresee the consequent ruin of the Liberal party with the destruction of the last hope for Home Rule.
