YOUTHFUL SOLDIERS OFF TO NIAGARA

B. C. I. Cadets Leave on Monday--Advance Guard First to Entrain.

The B. C. I. Cadets hold their annual summer camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake during next week. The advance guard gathers on Monday first at 6.30 a.m. at the Collegiate school, and will entrain on the T. H. & B. shortly afterwards, while the main body of the Cadets parade on Tuesday morning at the same hour at the Collegiate to leave for camp by the early morning train.

lieved apparently that with the support of these people they could carry several seats in the province. Accordingly, the Liberal leader has made public utterances on the bilingual school question which have been interpreted by the French as promising complete support for their demands, and to-day they are being called upon by their leaders to unite against Whitney and his Government and place Rowell in power so that they will get "educational rights."

Rowell's offer to the French, in the French-speaking districts, Mr. Rowell has been making curious statements. For instance, speaking to the electors of New Liskeard on the 10th, the Liberal leader said:

"But as there are children in this province belonging to other races, as English is the language of commerce, so is the language of diplomacy and of literature and of science, and it is only natural that they should desire to retain their mother tongue, and so, consistent with a good English education on the one hand, I would be glad to see, and I believe all public spirited citizens would be glad to see, the children of our French-Canadian fellow-citizens receive as well—(loud applause)—(Globe, June 11, 1914.)

At the convention which nominated Mr. Rowell's supporter in Russell (Mr. Racine), Mr. Sam Clarke, of Northumberland, another of Mr. Rowell's supporters, is reported as saying that the Toronto attitude towards the bilingual question was to be attributed to the "ignorance and miserable suspicions that the Conservatives entertained."

In other places Mr. Rowell has been referred to as the man who would "settle" the bilingual question. Le Temps and other French newspapers are supporting Mr. Rowell as the champion of their cause, and

SCHOOL CASE IN THE COURTS

Money Was With-held by the Government to Enforce Regulations.

(By Special Wire to the Courier)

OTTAWA, Ont., June 26—It developed at the hearing of the bilingual school case before Mr. Justice Lenox yesterday, that at the time of the famous walkouts of pupils here a year ago, when Protestant inspectors visited the English-French schools, the orders from parents to teachers directing that their children should be taught in French, and that they should leave when the Protestant inspectors appeared were for the most part on printed forms. Presumably these forms were distributed among the French families by the trustees who opposed the bilingual regulations. The letter form read:

"I have learned with regret that the government of Ontario has just ordered that French be taught only one hour per day and this only in the first form of the bilingual schools. It is with no little regret that I see the absolute control of our schools pass into the hands of English Protestant inspectors. I find that this is an unnameable injustice and I protest against this outrageous law. French and English must be taught, but before all our children must learn French, their mother tongue. In consequence I order that French be taught my children in all the classes and my children leave the school on the great barrier—control of schools—and open the way for a great colonization movement that will not long be delayed. There is in the Province of Quebec to-day a great organization having as its objects the placing of French colonies at strategic points in Canada. It is this organization that has planted French colonies at points through the West, that has located others along the line of the National Transcontinental in Northern Ontario and Northern Quebec.
