### LORD DUFFERIN.

A Tribute Paid to His Memory by a Te-

The death of Lord Dufferin cannot timely. He was near four score, and led an active, occupied life to Those who knew him will be the first to resent the notion that his fame and name suffered any lipse from the dealings of Whitaker Wright with the companies of which our ex-Governor-General was the ninal head. It cannot be urged not a business man, Everybody knew he was not, and it went without saying. It need not even be pleaded in extenuation. There was nothing to extenuate. a fault, and Lord Dufferin was sinned against rather than a sinner To everybody with whom he ever had intercourse, the news of his death will come as a heart pang. Brilliant, gay, affable and agreeable are the adjectives that throng one's mind as it reverts to his six year's stay amongst us. He was too sanguine and too generous ever to be classed with those of slower mind whose ability was of a colder and more matter-of-fact order. That he was our ablest Governor-General since Confederation is probably untrue; but let the crisis have what it might his buoyant intellect would have seen a way to tide it over. His genius was hardly constructive, though he left traces of a practical turn of mind at both Nia-gara and Quebec. He was a clever,

dexterous Irishman, of perfect address with the most courteous manners and a friendliness of demeanor never excelled. When reading a biography of his illustrious relative, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, one is irresistibly reminded of Lord Dufferin. I do not think he acted the part. It came naturally to him as part of his birthright. Sheridan's biography says: "The latter part of his life was embittered by misfortune, principally arising from his own impro-Mental anxiety completed the destruction of his health, and the famous wit and statesman, who was

born in Dullin, died there in 1816." If Lord Duferin was not improvident he was certainly very open-handed. He was the first Governor-General for some time who was not suspected of 'making a good thing out of his office.' His predecessors had laid by money to meet the requirements of their declining years in England. Lord Dufferin set an example of profuse hospitality at Ottawa, which has been bllowed by all his successors. He was one of the most inter-

esting men in the world. He would recall passages in his life from the days when he was at Eton and Oxford, where he was a contemporary of Goldwin Smith, down to the day of his departure from London to assume the Governorship of Canada.
