A SCOW FLOUNDERS.

Five of the Six Men on Board
Were Drowned on Sunday.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 21.—A special
from Newberry, Mich., says:—Word
has been received here by D. N. Mc-
Levy, lumberman, that one of his
scows, used in transporting freight
from Sault Ste. Marie to Deer Park,
where he has a number of lumber
camps, was caught in a storm on Lake
Superior Sunday morning off Deer
Park, and five of the six men on
board, were washed overboard, and
drowned. The dead:—Joseph Cas-
caden, Joseph Billings, Herman Win-
zel, Baron Nizel and Wm. —. Wil-
lam's family name is unknown, but
his residence is in Parkhill, Ont. An-
other scow, owned by Frank Perry,
of the Soo, on route with 200 tons of
steel rails and 10 logging cars for Mc-
Levy, Deer Park, foundered off White
Fish Point.

CZAR IS BETTER.

More Anxiety Abroad Than at
Home in Russia

Concerning his Condition—Anxious for
an Heir to the Throne.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 20.—A medical
practitioner of high standing in the
city who is not connected with the
state service, after analyzing the bul-
letins from Livadia, told the corre-
spondent of the Associated Press that
the illness of the Czar had taken an
unusually favorable course. "Appar-
ently," he said, "there is more anxiety
abroad than there is in Russia. This
may be due to the statistics of the
mortality in this country. But these
are misleading. The mortality with
us is due to defective care. Russia
has only one physician to every 30,000
inhabitants. Furnish her with one to
every five hundred, as in the United
States, and the results, with equal
care, would be as favorable here as
anywhere else."

HOPING FOR AN HEIR.

Death at this time would be pecu-
liarly bitter to Emperor Nicholas, be-
cause he is again hoping for the birth
of a son within a few months. It is
an open secret that the czar and the
Grand Duke Michael, now about 23
years of age, is not a favorite of the
emperor, whose supreme desire is to
leave a son as heir to the throne.

A St. Petersburg jurist who was asked
to-day whether a posthumous son
would inherit the throne, consulted
the works of the best authorities,
among them Prof. Korkounoff, of the
University of St. Petersburg, and
Professors Gradovitsky and Alexieff, of
the University of Moscow, and gave
the following reply:

"Existing laws do not answer the
question. The manifest of August 22,
1826, affords a precedent in an affir-
mative sense, but does not lay down a
general rule, confining itself to regu-
lating the concrete case then existing.
Nicholas I. in the manifest declared
that if he should die while the czarina
was enroute, the heir apparent then
living must wait until the birth before
assuming the powers and dignities of
czar, and that if the child were a son,
the latter should inherit. The present
czar is equally competent to regu-
late the case, if necessary."

THE LAW OF SUCCESSION.

The present law of succession de-
creasing primogeniture, with prefer-
ence to male lines and female lines be-
fore any woman could succeed, was
introduced by Paul I., whose mother,
Catherine II., who reigned from 1762
to 1796, did not respect his rights and
prepared a will by which he would
have been disinherited had it not been
destroyed upon her death. Paul I. at-
tempted to give the law a particularly
holy character, decreeing that all
his successors at their coronation
should swear to keep it inviolate. Nev-
ertheless his successors enjoy the

same unlimited powers as himself; and
several minor changes have been in-
troduced.

"If Emperor Nicholas should decree
the succession of a daughter his will
would be the law of the land, although
it is not believed that he would under-
take this. The sole features of the
law of succession which are considered
absolutely binding antedate Paul I.
They are the requirements that the
czar shall be of the orthodox religion
and that he shall not occupy any for-
eign throne."
