THE PREMIER'S SALARY.

There is some talk of increasing the salary of the Canadian Prime Minister. The Planet for its part believes that this should be done. As matters now stand, the occupant of that post receives \$8,000 a year, and the other ministers receive \$7,000 apiece. To say that \$1,000 adequately represents the difference between the cost of keeping up the position of Prime Minister and that of keeping up the position of an ordinary member of the cabinet, is absurd. The head of the government has to keep up an establishment of his own, and entertain in many ways, whereas other members of the cabinet can and do live at hotels. That, of course, is their own private affair and nobody's business; this paper simply refers to it as an illustration of the fact that they can if they so desire escape an obligation which a First Minister cannot ignore. It has been pointed out that other occupants of the post have got along on the \$8,000 per year. So they have, but that does not prove the sum to have been sufficient. Both Sir John Macdonald and Sir John Thompson left estates out of all proportion to their worth and service. The Permier of Ontario draws \$7,000 per annum. Will any same man argue that the position of premier of the whole Dominion should be worth only \$1,000 more than that? Men big enough to get at the top of banks, railways or other large corporations, are paid any-where from \$10,000 to over \$50,000 a year. In like manner, any man who is able to get at the top off the Dominion, should receive far more than the beggarly \$8,000 per year now al-

THE POPE AND THE FRENCH CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES.

The resolution adopted by the French

the alleged interference of the Pope in the internal affairs of France is apt to give rise to exaggerated ideas abroad, as to strained relations between the French government and the Holg See. The resolution, which was passed by an overwhelming majority, embodies the Premier's declaration to the effect that the government will not tolerate the organization of resistance against the laws of the country, and that no interference on the partiof the Pope will be allowed in the law of associations when it is voted upon; it recognizes that the Pope has rights as the spiritual head of the Catholics, but declares that the State also has rights written in the concordat, which it will see respected. Standing alone, formal declaration of this kind has defiant sound; but taken in conjunction with the official statement that the government saw no threat in the Pope's letter with regard to eastern missions; and with the fact that the resolution was adopted in preference to two others, one .calling for the separation of Church and State, and the other for the denunciation of the concordat, it seems to be capable of a much more pacific interpretation. In effect the resolution is no more \$466,429 than a declaration that the government will maintain the rights of the State, under the concordat, and His Holiness will probably be the first to recognize the duty of the French government in this connection. The concordat here referred to is practically a treaty between the Holy See and th French Republic, defining the respective rights of the Pope and the gov ernment in matters connected with the Church. Similar agreements exist between the Holy See and all Roman Catholic countries. A very close connection exists in France between the Church and State, although all religions in that country are theoretically equal. Any church with more than a hundred thousand members is entútled to state aid, and, as a matter of fact, Roman Catholics, Protestants and Jews, are in receipt of public


