Mrs. Archibald's Good Work.

Mrs. Archibald, of Wolfville, has a proud record of service to the Empire. She has sent overseas to Canadian soldiers in hospital and others the astonishing number of one thousand jars of jam for which she has collected the fruit, furnished most of the sugar and the jars, personally made, put up and packed. It is not surprising that she has received from Queen Mary a letter thanking her 'in the name of the British Empire'. This is a wonderful story of patriotic effort directed by one earnest, quiet, efficient woman into one helpful channel. Does it not speak eloquently to other women? Yesterday at the monthly meeting of the Red Cross, held in the Nova Scotia Technical College, a letter was read from Mrs. Archibald, in which she stated that she had received the letter from Queen Mary, and she will be asked to forward it in order that it may be published, heralding the fact that our queen, who is a true woman, ponders in her royal heart the service being wrought by the individual woman. The Society, who has heard something of Mrs. Archibald's passionate jam-making, has from time to time sent her a few jars and a little sugar but any woman who knows the 'secrets' of jam making, knows what quantity of sugar is represented by 1500 jars, and will recognize as the splendid largeness of the gift. She is going to continue the work, and, doubtless, once the public know of her good work, they will rejoice to contribute their quota of both jars and sugar. A letter came only a few days ago from men at No. 2 Base Hospital, Boulogne, telling enthusiastically of their enjoyment of some toothsome jars of Nova Scotia strawberry jam sent to them by this lady. France, Dec. 11th, 1916. Dear Madam, - Owing to having the good fortune in being sent to this hospital, and Canadian Stationary, I had great pleasure in sharing some of your fine preserves, which our dear nation sent up to this ward (Prince Edward Island ward).

Being a Canadian, I have been chosen to write you this letter of thanks on behalf of myself and four other patients who represent all parts of the Empire: Australia, British West Indies, England and Scotland.

Sister Bryne, our good sister of this ward, brought us cream to serve with the strawberries, and I must say that it outlasted anything I have tasted for years, and so say all in this ward.

I sure falls me to put into words our thoughts telling you how we appreciate your kindness. It is a great comfort to us to know that our dear ones across the sea never forget us.

This is a splendid hospital and our highest praises is a poor token of thanks for all that is done for us by our dear nation, sisters and doctors to get us fit again.

I will now conclude, dear madam, wishing you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year from all the patients in Prince Edward Island ward. Yours sincerely,

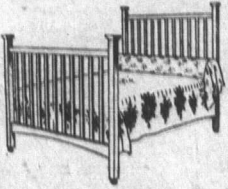
