Editorial Brevities.

At a meeting of the Council held last week an important step was taken in the direction of the vexed question of assessment. On the invitation of Mayor Hales, Professor Balcom who has made a close study of the subject, expressed his views. He pointed out many of the difficulties in the way of enforcing the present law, which he showed was antiquated and unworkable and not adapted to the needs of the present. Professor Balcom suggested, and the Council agreed, that the best method of procedure would be to ask the co-operation of the municipalities and incorporated towns of the province in memorialising the government, asking for such a revision of the law as will make possible a equitable taxation. A committee was appointed who have the matter in hand, and THE ACADIAN understands that already a number of favorable replies have been received to the communication sent out.

Id the matter of road construction Wolfville took a forward step when a few years ago it undertook the laying down of a permanent street through the business section of the town. With slight exception this has been the only real attempt at advance in road-making in the province. We understand that it is the intention of the Council, now that the war is over, to continue the work, interrupted when the war began. Such a step will, we are sure, be approved by citizens. The improvement in Main street has favorably advertised our town and its fine condition has been commented on by visitors to Wolfville during recent years. Since Wolfville is doing permanent work along this line and setting a good example thereby to other communities THE ACADIAN believes that the Council would be justified in asking the legislature for exemption from the highway tax recently imposed. Our share of that tax last year was something like six hundred dollars, and if good roads is the objective it is very apparent that it could have been much more profitably spent by our own officials. A move was made some years ago to extend this good street in every direction outside the limits of Wolfville. This should be again taken up, and the government should not only exempt the sections undertaking this work but should make a substantial grant towards the expense. The principle of a general highway tax may be perfectly all right, but unless some different method of road-making is undertaken by the government no very great improvement can be looked for.

30 Years Ago.

The following extracts are taken from the files of "THE ACADIAN" of 30 years ago:
A meeting of the residents of Wolfville was held in the vestry of the Methodist church on Saturday evening last to consider the advisability of making an effort to procure an efficient water supply. Mr. G. V. Hales was made chairman and Mr. Geo. W. Munro secretary. Dr. Bass made a lengthy explanation of the object of the meeting, also giving the bounds of the proposed water district, and stated the probable cost at in the vicinity of \$20,000. After speeches from other gentlemen the following resolution was unanimously passed.
Resolved, that we request the Legislature of this province now in session to pass an act incorporating this village for "water purposes" thus enabling us to acquire water and water property and protect ourselves efficiently against fire.
