DEATHS.—Mr. Wm. Warrington, of Garrettsville, died rather suddenly last week. He was only about 45 years of age. It is reported he was hurt some time since. Mr. Jonathan Lister, of Eramosa, died this morning at the ripe age of 84 years. He was one of the oldest landmarks in Eramosa, coming there over 50 years ago. He has been universally respected, and was an intelligent well read man. Of late he has been unable to see, and has been in failing health till the appearance of the dread visitor was a welcome relief.

The Campaign in Britain.

LONDON, June 29.—Mr. Gladstone left for Midlothian today. As the train stopped at the various stations along the line the crowds that had assembled cheered him heartily. At several stations, notably Warrington, Wigan and Preston, addresses were presented to him which he acknowledged in brief speeches. An enormous and highly enthusiastic crowd awaited the arrival of Mr. Gladstone at Edinburgh, and when the train bearing the statesman arrived at that place Mr. Gladstone received an ovation. H. M. Stanley and wife were mobbed this evening, and were badly frightened. The Parnellite Committee of Great Britain, while regretting Gladstone's retirement, has issued a formal address advising Irish electors to support Gladstonian candidates on the ground that Gladstone will then have no excuse to withhold the details of his Home Rule scheme. It is stated the Executive Committee of the Parnellites in Dublin will issue a similar address. DUBLIN, June 29.—William O'Brien, addressing a political meeting at Cork today, said that Mr. Gladstone had obtained full confidence of the McCarthys, and they now knew that Mr. Gladstone's Home Rule bill from the Nationalists' point of view would be as good and in some respects better than the bill Parnell had accepted in 1890.

The London Poisoner.

MONTREAL, June 29.—Many instances of the Canadian career of Neil or Cream, the London poisoner, are coming out. He was accounted a thorough blackguard by those who know his habits. Cream, while a student at McGill College, made a bold attempt to swindle a leading insurance company of this city. At the time he was boarding in the house of Miss Jane Porter, 106 Mansfield Street, and now of Toronto. On April 16, 1876, a fire broke out in Cream's bedroom. It started in a drawer of his bureau and he was insured in the company referred to for \$1,000. To the astonishment of the company he claimed damages amounting to \$975.40. He valued his clothing at \$461.40, pictures and books at \$295, and surgical instruments at \$219. The insurance company suspected Cream of incendiarism, but they were unable to prove it. The matter was finally left to arbitration and three medical men awarded Cream \$350 and a check was given Cream for the amount. Cream was also something of a practical joker. When the fire occurred in his room he dressed a skeleton in a suit of his clothes and laid it on his bed. The firemen thinking it was a dead man carried the dressed skeleton out.

New York, June 29.—Inspector Fred. Varney of the Scotland Yard Secret Service has been in New York City on Saturday last.

Thos. Neil, the London poisoner of several London girls, receiving the attention of Inspector Neil is also charged with the murder of W. H. Smith, the London merchant, and the inspector is following up a long list of names.

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
