CENTREVILLE HAS SUCCESSFUL FAIR

Attendance Large But Exhibits Not
Up to Average in Numbers

The Centreville Agricultural Fair held the 19th and 20th was a success financially and otherwise. A record number of tickets was sold for the two days and if the last day had been fine the crowd would have been too large for the grounds. The Red Cross Society provided meals in the large dining room at the rear of the exhibition building and anyone could get all they could eat of food of the very best quality for the modest sum of 50 cents. The wisdom of having a yearly show well advertised early in the season was clearly demonstrated as former exhibitors were in doubt about there being a show this year and did not prepare for it. On this account the exhibits in some classes were not nearly as good or as numerous as in former years. Horses showed up well but not so many as usual. The cattle show was good. A fat freak calf owned by W. Crawford of Royalton was quite a curiosity. Poultry were good in numbers and quality and local people this year got the prizes. Roots and vegetables were excellent. Fruits also were very good for this section. The dairy exhibit was also good, some butter testing out 95 per cent perfect. But up stairs in the building was the best exhibit ever at any of our shows. Hand made fancy work in all varieties of articles that can be made by the ladies, also paintings, etc. Many visitors who have attended all the big shows for years pronounced this the best exhibit they had ever seen.

The hog and sheep exhibit was very poor. Now that hogs are such a fancy price we expected to see a large entry in this class. Probably scarcity of feed through the summer had an injurious effect.

The managers of the fair are every year learning a little more about running shows and this year the lesson learned will be to have some attraction in addition to the exhibits.

The scarcity of funds has been the draw-back in former years, but now that the Society is out of debt there should be an inclination to branch out and make Centreville Fair an annual occurrence with all the necessary fixings added.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS IN PROVINCE

Two Cases at Grand Falls and
Quarantine Established

Fredericton, Sept. 22.—Infantile paralysis, a dread disease which has caused many deaths among children in the United States within the last few years, again has made its appearance in New Brunswick. Two well defined cases have occurred at Grand Falls. Dr. R. H. McGrath of this city, secretary of the provincial board of health, returned from Grand Falls on Thursday after placing quarantine restrictions on two dwellings in which the cases were.

The provincial authorities are keeping close watch upon Grand Falls and vicinity in case there may be further developments.

It is feared that there will be a spread of the disease in that section as children have been exposed to infection. Warm weather gives infantile paralysis its most favorable condition and the fact that cool weather is now at hand gives great encouragement in the fight against the disease. The source of the infection is believed to have been the State of Maine.

This is the first occasion on which infantile paralysis has been reported so far north in the province. Former cases were in Charlotte county, also originating in the United States. None were fatal.

Raymond-London

A quiet wedding took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Raymond of Middle Simonds on Tuesday afternoon when their only daughter, Mabel, was united in marriage with El Roy London, of Nanton, Alberta. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. D. Wetmore and the happy couple departed on the afternoon express for a honeymoon trip. They will return here before going to Alberta. The bride is a popular young lady and the groom is well known here, being a Woodstock boy.

Tragic Death of Ray Hatfield

Ray Hatfield, son of Wint Hatfield of Mount Pleasant, was struck by an automobile at Caribou on Sunday and received injuries from which he died yesterday morning. He was 20 years of age and was employed as a chauffeur in Caribou. The remains were brought here last evening and the funeral is held today.

ROBERT HENDERSON DIED ON FRIDAY

Well Known Pioneer of Armand
Passes Away After Long Illness

On Friday Robert Henderson, one of the best known residents of the parish, died at his home at Armand after having endured a long illness. He was 75 years of age and had lived at Armand—formerly known as "Henderson's Corner"—for 57 years, going there to settle when he was 18 years of age. Mr. Henderson was born in Queens county and came here with his parents and brothers and sisters in the "fifties." Besides the wife, who was Matilda Spiney, there survives one son, Armand, and one daughter, the wife of Henry Smith of Windsor. There are also two brothers, William S. of Hartland and Albert of South Musquash; also three sisters: Mrs. Alfred Tedford of Windsor, Mrs. Andrew Gault of St. John, and Mrs. John Mann in California. The deceased was an honest man and a good neighbor and bore the respect of a wide circle of friends. In politics he was a Liberal.

The funeral on Sunday was very largely attended.

PRODUCE PRICES

Farmers report yields of good potatoes all the way from 40 to 80 barrels per acre, while 100 barrels is considered a big crop. There are lots of good potatoes in the country. Digging is well under way and weather conditions are such as though the farmers had ordered it. The spuds have been coming to market rather freely and around \$2 has been the prevailing price.

The oat crop is turning out all the way from poor to fair, to very good. Late grain was injured by frost and early-sown grain was hurt by the long wet spell. The acreage was larger than usual and the crop, locally, will total about as last year. Farmers will not name a selling price, and there are as yet no serious attempts to buy. It is believed that oats touched the top price last season.

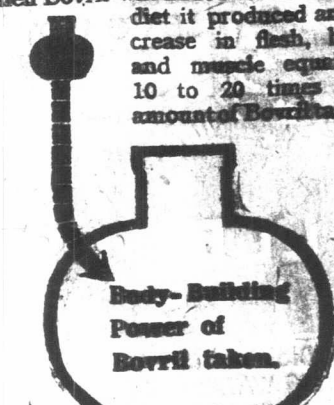
Butter is being hoarded for a wartime profit by many farmers and wage-earners in the village this week paid 50 cents a pound for it. Eggs reached the fancy price of 45 cents.

High as 12 cents has been paid for live pork and beef is correspondingly high. Lambs have been bringing \$8 to \$10 and more.

Wood is being held for \$10 by some and \$15 by others. Of course no one will consider burning up money in this fashion while there is a plentiful supply of coal at much less money for the same amount of heat.
