MURDER DIAZ

(Continued from page 1)

Stenched there.

Captain Alcalde says the message pronouncing the death penalty on General Diaz was among the papers carried by the captured officer. Here is the plan by which, Alcalde says, General Diaz is to be made away with: The spies of Huerta, who are following Diaz, are to notify the head of the Mexican Government a day previous to that of Diaz's entry into Mexico relative to the point at which he will make the crossing. As soon as Diaz is on Mexican ground he will be captured by a party of federals masquerading as insurgents, and carrying an insurrecto flag. Within an hour after his capture this band will be set upon by another band of federals and in the sham battle that will follow the general will be killed.

"This is merely a step in the programme of Huerta," said Captain Alcalde. "He will follow it with the disposition of others whom he thinks stand in his way toward a supreme dictatorship in Mexico. We have the message calling for the death of Diaz in our headquarters at Hermosillo. Diaz will not live twenty-four hours after entering our country, if the plans of Huerta are executed.

"It is for this reason, we believe, and no other, that Diaz is going to Europe instead of returning to Mexico. We believe his friends have obtained the information and 'warned him.'"
