SAYRE INDUSTRIES STILL EXPANDING

Building New Mill in Madawaska—Ships 1,000,000 Feet From Hartland Yards for Great Britain

F. E. Sayre, the well known lumber man of St. John, whose industry means so much to Hartland, has secured large timber limits on Grand River, which empties into the St. John a short distance above St. Leonard, and will build a mill there of about the same capacity of the larger Hartland mill, capable of sawing a round 40,000 feet a day. N. E. Constantine, who came here from Antigonish seven years ago and has since been chief book-keeper to Mr. Sayre's Hartland office, has been appointed general manager and overseer of the new enterprise at Grand River, and he left on Monday to take up his new duties. Mr. Constantine's family will remain here and he expects to get a trip back to town every week or two. He is succeeded in the Hartland office by Frank R. Kelley, present police magistrate and town treasurer. Mr. Kelley has had a long experience in book-keeping for a lumber concern in northern Antigonish.

The Sayre concern has undertaken and is successfully filling one of the largest "rush" orders ever placed in this section, it being for 1,000,000 feet of lumber for immediate delivery at wharf in St. John for export to Great Britain. This order calls for 60 carloads and is filled from stock stored in Hartland yards. Twenty-four carloads were billed out last week and it is expected most of the remainder will be on the way to St. John by the end of this week. The station yard presents a busy scene with the work in hand. The immense order does not materially deplete the stock in the yards. There are still huge piles untouched, and the mill keeps sawing every day.

The Becaguimac mill was built in 1894 by A. H. Sawyer of Calais, and was equipped with gang saws. He ran the mill for ten years, when it was purchased by Mr. Sayre. Improved rotary saws were installed and the mill runs steadily six months of each year. Last year Mr. Sayre purchased the Price & Nevers mill in the lower part of the town and now operates two plants here. Nearly 100 men are employed in the summer months and a greater number in the woods during the winter. The lumber supply for the Becaguimac mill is cut on the head waters of that stream—five or six millions each winter. That for the lower mill is cut on nearly properties, in part, but the greater supply is bank logs rafted from further up the St. John.

The enterprise is easily Hartland's chief industry. Ald. A. E. Campbell has been manager of the Hartland mill since it was built 25 years ago, and before coming here was employed in the same capacity many years by the late Mr. Sawyer at Benton.

Blacksmith Shop Burned

Fire on Saturday afternoon about 3:30 destroyed the blacksmith shop occupied by Ferley Clark. Just how the fire caught is a mystery. Mr. Clark had left the premises for a few minutes and soon smoke was seen coming from the building. In a surprisingly short space of time the interior was a mass of seething flame. Furious as the fire was when the hose company arrived it was speedily brought under control.

Mr. Clark's loss is heavy, his tools and stock being badly dam-

aged. The building was erected by the Hartland Cement Block Co., a few years ago, and was for a time used by them in their tile-making enterprise. It was the property of J. T. G. Carr at time of fire and it carried no insurance.

HAY CROP IS ALMOST AVERAGE

Potatoes and Grain, Helped by Showers Look Promising

Reports from all sections of the province state that haying is being completed after a splendid period of fine weather. Some sections report a slight improvement in the crop, due to recent rains. The crop is not so light in Carleton and the northern counties as at first thought it would be. In other parts it varied according to whether meadows were new or old. There are some very good new meadows in the central, southern and eastern countries. The older meadows, generally speaking, were inclined to be light.

The grain crop is heading out rapidly. It has a good color and if it fills properly there should be a fair crop. The straw is short in most sections, but is still growing and recent rains will be of immense benefit.

The potato crop continues to be promising. The tops have a good color and are growing well. Northumberland and Restigouche reports indicate that the crop is looking exceptionally well; Madawaska, Victoria, and Carleton counties good, with spraying being carried on generally. Other sections report crop looking promising.

In general, the pastures are holding up well and the milk flow is good for the time of the year.

Live stock of all kinds is said to be in good condition.

Fish A-Plenty

Owen Clarke, H. D. Keswick, Allen Cummings, Guy McLaughlan, William Albright and Roy Clarke went on a fishing trip to the Nashwaak last week and they report a catch totaling 1500 fishes. Owen said most of them were caught in one pool, that surged and boiled like a wash-pot with the myriads of fish. When he desired to bait a hook he found it necessary to hide behind a clump of bushes to prevent being overwhelmed by the fishy tribe.

The spot where the fishermen met such luck is remote and rather inaccessible hence the fishing ground is practically untouched.

CARLETON-VICTORIA LIBERAL DELEGATES

James Burgess, Dr. F. W. Griffin and Albion K. Foster are the Three Delegates

The Carleton-Victoria Liberal convention, called to choose delegates to the national gathering at Ottawa next week, was held on Tuesday at Andover, and was representative of both counties, and in character harmonious.

John R. Flemming was elected chairman and C. E. Gallagher, secretary of the meeting. It was moved by Andrew McCain, seconded by G. W. Upham that a committee on resolutions be appointed. The motion carried and Hon. W. P. Jones, Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Frank Gillespie, John W. Bohan and Dr. Griffin were nominated and on motion were unanimously elected members of the resolutions committee.

It was moved by Joseph Fewer, seconded by John Holmes that a nominating committee from the different sections of the constituency be moved and, on motion, the following were elected the nominating committee:

Robert L. Simms, David Collins, James Scott, Allan Barter, William J. Gallagher, Geo. Hanson, John Fulton, Fred C. Elliott, Judson Corrie, Daniel McKellor, Allan McDougall.

While the committees were at work John S. Leighton and Geo. Upham spoke of the necessity of organization. This was followed by a motion, moved by A. D. McCain and seconded by Wm. Morgan that organization of the constituency be proceeded with. Later in the meeting it was moved that Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, G. W. Upham and A. D. McCain be a committee to recommend names of a president, first and second vice-president, secretary and treasurer to form the basis of a Liberal organization for Carleton-Victoria.

J. E. Porter also spoke while the reports of the committees were being prepared and received hearty applause.

The resolutions, as submitted by the committee, follow:

Whereas, It has pleased Almighty God to remove from his sphere of earthly activities our revered and respected leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, be it

Resolved, That we deplore his death at this time which seems an irreparable loss when his splendid qualities of statesmanship, great parliamentary experience, high-minded unprejudiced patriotism, together with his proven ability to meet and adjust the most serious crisis in the country's affairs makes his loss more felt, when we require men possessing his splendid qualities of character to deal with the present disturbed conditions in Canada and bring them back to a normal state where its citizens will work together for the country's prosperity and advancement, and

Whereas, The greatest war in the history of the world is now ended, we feel that we cannot let this opportunity pass without putting ourselves on record as having given recognition as well as expression to our admiration at the courage, daring and valor of our Canadian soldiers who not only brought lustre and glory to the country they represent but by their achievements contributed largely to the victory of the Allied forces in defeating the Huns, restoring peace and establishing, we hope forever, the principles of Christian liberty and democracy throughout the civilized world, and further,

Resolved, That this convention do, by this resolution, express its sincere and heartfelt sympathy

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
