A RECORD YEAR.

No city can afford to nourish local jealousies or set one end of a town against the other. It is impos-sible that every portion of a city can be equally favored because that district which is most favorable for business will always have a preference over one part of the city must necessarily benefit every other part, even those localities which are most remots from it. We trust that the people of Freedericton will never display so small a spirit as that which has just been shown in Halifax.

It is to be hoped that the dog show will have the effect of causing persons who are fond of dogs to obtain a bet-ter class of animals and that it will assist in the suppression of worthless curs which are simply a nuisance.
