SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

Yesterday Sir Wilfrid Laurier was 61 years old and was receiving the congratulations of his friends over his birthday. Sir Wilfrid is now sejourning in a milder climate than that of Canada and taking a much needed rest preparatory to the work of the session which will soon begin. Everyone will be glad to see him return from his sojourn in the south with renewed health and strength, for Sir Wilfrid Laurier is popular even among his political opponents, and he is a man whom Canada could not spare. At his age he may reasonably anticipate many years of useful public service. Mr. Gladstone ran his last election and became Premier of a new government when he was upwards of eighty and we hope that Sir Wilfrid Laurier may enjoy an equal length of days.

A RECORD YEAR.

This is the record year for steamer navigation on the St. John river. No other season within the memory of man can compare with it for the length of the time the river has been open. The first steamer went up the river as far as Hampstead on the 19th of March and now it is the 21st of November, so that the boats on the lower reaches of the river have been running for eight months. As the river is still free from ice it is quite probable that the steamers on the lower part of the river will be running for another fortnight. The David Weston has just completed her 100 round trip from Indian town to this city, which is the largest number of trips made by that boat or any other in one season. The May Queen made her last trip to Grand Lake this week having been running on that route upwards of seven months, which is a long way ahead of any previous record. Unfortunately the earliness of the opening of navigation did not seem to effect the agricultural interest as favorably as it was hoped it would do, for with respect to farming the season was rather backward. The people of this province would prefer an earlier season for the farmer even if the river did not open quite so soon.

LOCAL JEALOUSY.

What are we to think of a city so filled with local jealousy that the people of one end of it prefer to throw away a gift of a library building worth \$75,000 rather than that it should be located in that part of the city in which they do not live? This is the case with the people of Halifax and it seems to be a fair illustration of one of the causes why that city with all its natural advantages has advanced so slowly. We cannot see how any community can be prosperous or progressive which contains such hostile elements as seem to have fixed their abode in Halifax. No city can afford to nourish local jealousies or set one end of a town against the other. It is impossible that every portion of a city can be equally favored because that district which is most favorable for business will always have a preference over localities which do not possess the same advantage, yet the development of one part of the city must necessarily benefit every other part, even those localities which are most remote from it. We trust that the people of Fredericton will never display so small a spirit as that which has just been shown in Halifax.

DOGS.

St. John has just been having a dog show which is declared, by the papers of that city, to have been the most successful that has been held in St. John for many years. The show proved that New Brunswick possesses a great many fine dogs and no doubt a great many excellent animals were not there at all, the display being mostly confined to dogs in the vicinity of the city.

A good dog is something that is worthy to be valued, but it is also true that there are many dogs in this province which can only be classed as worthless. All our cities abound in curs which are neither beautiful nor useful and there are also many dogs of the same class in the rural districts. The existence of the latter is one of the reasons why sheep farming in New Brunswick has become almost a lost art, for the presence of dogs is much more fatal to sheep than are the wild animals which are found in our forests. It is to be hoped that the dog show will have the effect of causing persons who are fond of dogs to obtain a better class of animals and that it will assist in the suppression of worthless curs which are simply a nuisance.

CABLE SATISFACTORY.

The Official Test Previous to Taking Over of Pacific Cable.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 21.—Mr. Darlove, who has conducted a test of the Pacific cable at Bamfield station, is here on his way to London. He has found the cable entirely satisfactory and has formally taken it over for the cable board from the construction company. A speed of 110 letters a minute was obtained, which is ten per cent. higher than was expected.

A VAST PROPOSITION.

Deal Going on to Amalgamate the Various Roads

Which Give New York Its Rapid Transit.

Many Millions Invested—What Would be Gained.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—In magnitude the rumored proposition to combine the underground rapid transit road now being constructed and the Manhattan elevated system surpasses anything of the kind in history of municipal transit, says the New York Herald. The Manhattan elevated railway system embraces 37 miles of double track road. It is now in process of equipment with electricity and this work has been nearly completed. It operates 334 locomotives or motors and 1,122 passenger cars. Its authorized capital stock is \$18,000,000, of which \$17,000,000 has been received. Its outstanding debt is \$39,883,000. In addition to the lines already built, it has franchises for additional extensions in the Bronx. The Interborough Rapid Transit Company is the owner of the plans of the operators of rapid transit tunnel. When John B. McDonald obtained the contract for the construction of the tunnel, August Belmont formed a syndicate which took the corporate shape of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Co. capitalised at \$60,000,000. A new company for the specific purpose of operating a rapid transit tunnel and any other tunnel, roads, or extensions that might be authorized by the rapid transit commission was created, and in pursuance of this idea the International Rapid Transit Company was incorporated on May 6th of the present year. Mr. Belmont also is president of this company. The capital is \$85,000,000.

A contract also is held by the Subway Construction Co. to build an extension of the tunnel to Brooklyn under the East River. By purchase of Manhattan lines the Subway Company or its successor the Interborough Company would have to transfer to the elevated at many points where the lines cross each other, thus forming a perfect network covering the entire island. Statistics of the Company are believed to be under process of amalgamation show a total stock issue of \$80,000,000 and a bond issue of \$38,000,000. The mileage foots up 97.75.

SANITARIUM.

Coroners Jury Recommendation to the Quebec Government.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—The coroners jury brought in a verdict to the effect that J. B. Vanallen died from peritonitis and exonerated Virginia Gobeille from all blame. Vanallen not being a fasting patient. The jury, however, brought in a strong recommendation that all private sanitariums and private hospitals be placed under government supervision.
