

Milk is also very scarce. Only the sick in the hospitals are supplied regularly with either article.

At daybreak on Monday Colonel La-coste with a body of Spanish troops fell suddenly upon the camp of the insurgent General Castillo at Santo Cristobal, Province of Havana, simultaneously attacking the front and rear. The insurgents were overpowered, and abandoned the position, losing 16 killed and 11 wounded. The Spanish losses were six killed and thirteen wounded.

The insurgent General Perico Diaz and Leader Gilla have made a successful raid in Weyler's valley in southeast Spain. The Spanish troops, under the command of General Perico Diaz, were defeated, and the Spanish losses were six killed and thirteen wounded.

A body of local Guerrillas near Manzanillo, while out foraging, were surprised by the insurgents and in the engagement that followed lost eight killed and 11 seriously wounded men.

DESERTING JACKSON.

THE EXODUS ON ACCOUNT OF YELLOW FEVER STOPPING.

Jackson, Miss., September 16.—No more people are leaving the city, for two reasons—there are very few left here and none of those who remain are corresponding to the rigid quarantine thrown around the town.

Business is dead. The town having been rid of the exorable persons (to the number of several thousands) the chances of those remaining are correspondingly increased should trouble occur, and the people are, therefore, feeling easier. There are eight cases of yellow fever at present in town.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The dead and dumb asylum at Fredericton, N. B., was entirely destroyed by fire on Monday evening 19th inst. The fire originated from a lamp explosion. A portion of the furniture was saved, and all the inmates—some fifty persons—were rescued without injury. The institute was erected about 7 years ago and cost \$8000. Insured \$4000 in the London & Lancashire.
