In fact, it is alleged he is still in the hand of the living, and that he has floated at least one company of the kind since, down in southern Ohio. He had charge of the case and shipped the body to relatives in New York State for burial. He has no doubt the body shipped was that of the colonel. Stoddart, he says, was known to him in life, and he thinks his suspicions would have been aroused if the remains were not like

New York Stock Market Outlook. Henry Clews says: Our security market still appears to be suffering from Indigestion. While the patient is not seriously ill, and fortunately possesses a vigorous constitution, still the attack, it must be remembered, was precipitated by long and unusual excesses, so that the process of recuperation is necessarily slow, painful, and accompanied by periods of despondency and hopefulness. The Crop Prospect. Edward G. Heeman, Chicago, says: It would seem as if the price of wheat for the twelve months to come wheat for the twelve months to come is likely to range at a very high level, rather over than under 30 cents. The question is, when will the advance to over that figure take place? I believe it will be within the next few weeks. Indications, some time ago, favored a crop of winter wheat of almost 550,000,000 bushels, but it has shrunken until I doubt wheat of almost 550,000,000 bushels, but it has shrunken until I doubt whether the next Government report will show that the yield will be much over 350,000,000 bushels, and the total crop of winter and spring wheat may not be over 650,000,000 bushels. This will be smaller than the crop raised last year, and considerably smaller than the 1901 crop.
