BIG AUTO RACE.

Barney Oldfield Is Driving Car No. 13.

Briarcliff, N. Y., April 24.—Twenty-two automobiles of the finest American and foreign types, started at dawn today in a 259 mile race for supremacy over one of the most hazardous courses ever chosen for a modern speed contest. For just a little over 32 miles the course winds through picturesque country in Northern West Chester County.

Almost every turn of the course is a danger spot and there were many predictions of serious accidents before the race was run. The danger of the course and the possibility of serious mishaps had added tremendously to the interest in contests of this kind and long before the hour scheduled for the start the course was lined with automobiles filled with spectators. At 3 o'clock this morning, it was estimated that 1,000 automobiles were packed along the course. The start had been scheduled for 4:25 o'clock, but it was 40 minutes later before preparations for the beginning of the race had been completed and exactly at 5:07 the start was made. The veteran, Barney Oldfield, who braved the fate associated with this kind of driving a car bearing that number, was given a rousing cheer when he stood at the starting line awaiting the signal. At 5:24 o'clock, seventeen minutes after the first car had left the starting point, word came back from Armour that four cars already had passed that place, 17 miles away. One of these four cars had been only 13 minutes on the road.

Strang, in car No. 4, the first to complete the circuit, crossed the line in 39 minutes 42 seconds. He was leading Little, in car No. 3, only by seconds, but maintained his advantage through the second round which he completed in 38 minutes 23 seconds with a lead of 2 mins. 24 seconds over Little, and also was in the lead at the end of the third round, which was made in 39 minutes 18 seconds. While the leading cars were in the fifth round word came to the judges' stand that Murphy, in car No. 10, of Austrian make, had met with an accident in the stretch of road between Valhalla and Eastview. One of his front wheels collapsed and his mechanism were thrown out. Fortunately neither man was injured, but as Murphy did not have a spare wheel, his car was taken out of the race.

A very exciting game of ball was played this morning at the city lot, between the Royal Stars and the Broadviews, the latter winning by a score of 9 to 0.


