Immediately following the general election, Hon. T. A. Crerar, leader of the National Progressives, and head of the largest group in opposition to the coming Liberal Ministry of the official opposition, but a Liberal Progressive alliance within the bounds of possibility.. Should it be brought about, Mr. Crerar, instead of opposing, will support the Government. Conservatives will then naturally become the official opposition and Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen (if he decides to remain in politics) will be the leader. Mr. Meighen will, however, have to secure a seat.


