In certain distric's a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre cies-Reside six months in each o hree years after earning homestead atent and cultivate 50 xtercasre May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain con

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-amption, may take a purchased homestead n certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
