### Canadian North-West Land Regulations

The sole head of a family, 21 years of age or over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. The six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section of pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead and cultivate 50 acres. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holdings of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned holders who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agency's Office (not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

### Legislative Assembly.

#### Prince Edward Island.

##### Rules Relating to Private Bills.

36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

### Comprehensive Report From Niigata

Japan is a country that offers special difficulties to the apostle. Therefore we are glad to get reports from its missionaries.

Rev. Joseph Reiners, S. V. D. is Prefect Apostolic of Niigata, and his latest communication is both interesting and comprehensive.

"It will be a consolation to the friends of our mission to learn that our work is going on despite of the disfavor of the time. The great number of the faithful has diminished by a little, mostly on account of deaths and migration into other missions, on the other hand the noticeable increase of the number of catechumens gives us good hope for the new year.

"A special blessing was on the different institutions of our mission. The number of the pupils of Akita showed a considerable increase, so that we were obliged to take recourse to the rooms of kindergarten, which we had to give up subsequently. The children of the Orphan Asylum are our joy and our hope. But from want of space we can hardly admit new children. The Holy Ghost Hospital of Kanazawa does a work full of blessing. Here, too, the space is getting inefficient. Both in Kanazawa and in Akita the Sisters are lodged in a part of the buildings of the institutions, as they have no dwelling as yet.

"But there is another question that demands very much more urgently a solution. That is the question of Japanese assistant workers. This touches the very heart and life of our mission. We have no more than six catechists in all for fourteen missionary stations, whilst in a well established mission every single missionary should have several catechists. Anyone having an idea of what mission work is must admit that we can expect no great success with just six catechists among a population of six million souls.

"Last year we founded St. Paul's College in Niigata to which graduates of Middle Schools, or such who had at least finished the fourth year of Middle School, should be admitted, and trained in a three years' course. But it soon appeared that of such young men not many apply for the profession of a catechist. So we determined to found a seminary for educating such boys who feel in them the vocation to become catechists or priests. Despite the hardships of the time, we are going to open the seminary at Easter, 1919, trusting to God and our benefactors, under the protection of Saint John, the Apostle and Evangelist, who will be the patron of the seminary.

"The salvation of the souls entrusted to us depends on this seminary. If we get able Japanese assistant workers, the success of our mission will be sure. That the Russian mission was so flourishing for some time in the past, that the Protestant missions have no many adherents, is due to the fact that they from the very beginning turned their attention to the training of Japanese assistant workers. Dear reader, could you allow the mission of the great Catholic Church being forced to forego, for lack of resources, the indispensable help of native assistant workers?

"Our friends and benefactors, who in the past year so faithfully helped us through these hard times, I herewith tender, in the name of all our missionaries, my hearty thanks, and wish them God's abundant blessings."
