The Disloyalty Theory.

The disloyalty cry has been worn thin
by too much use, but now and then it is
still raised against the friends of unre-
stricted reciprocity. It would be dis-
loyal, say the Tories, who have clapped
well-nigh prohibitory duties on British
exports, to discriminate in favor of Amer-
ican and against British goods. With-
out touching the merits of the case at
present, it may be well to recall the fact
that the Tories themselves were once
quite willing to adopt this principle, pro-
vided they could obtain closer trade rela-
tions with the United States. The whole
story came out in a debate in the
House of Commons in 1870, on a resolu-
tion in favor of a customs union move-
d by the late Mr. Huntington. Mr.
Huntington stated that the Government
of the day had been in negotiation with
the authorities at Washington, and had
offered to discriminate against England.
The London Times was informed of the
negotiations, and in an article in Sep-
tember, 1869, said editorially: "It is at
this very moment a matter of discussion
in Canada whether a treaty of reciprocity
should not be concluded with the
United States; and the result of the de-
liberations may very possibly be the
admission of the manufactures of New
England into the Dominion under lighter
duties than the manufactures of Great
Britain." The Times did not consider
this to be a disloyal proposition, for it
went on to say: "If the Canadian Min-
istry come to the conclusion that such an
arrangement is for the benefit of the
country, will the Colonial Office advise
the Crown to disallow the negotiations?
Assuredly not."

Sir John Macdonald and Sir Francis
Hincks attempted to make it appear that
both Mr. Huntington and the Times had
been misinformed. In the course of the
discussion, Mr. Alexander Mackenzie
stated that in 1865, when it was known
that Congress was averse to prolonging
the treaty of 1854, Sir John had propos-
ed a very similar measure; in fact, had
gone so far as to propose reciprocal tariff
legislation, our tariff to be regulated by
that of the United States. To this, Sir
John replied that it was the Secretary
of the United States Treasury, Mr. Mc-
Culloch, who had suggested that arrange-
ment. Mr. Mackenzie answered as fol-
lows:—"The hon gentleman will not
escape from me in that way. There was
a minute of course which was when I
was invited to join the Government,
which proposed a system of reciprocal
legislation." This settled the dispute
about the nature of the negotiations in
1865, and helped, to some extent, to
corroborate Mr. Huntington's version of
the character of the negotiations in 1869.
The latter affair was, some years after-
wards, cleared up by Mr. George Brown.
Shortly after his return from Washing-
ton, after trying to negotiate a reciprocity
treaty, Mr. Brown made a speech on
the subject in the Senate, in which he
said:—

"In 1869 formal negotiations were
entered into with the American Govern-
ment, and the project of a treaty was
presented for discussion. The negotia-
tions continued from July, 1869, to
March, 1870. The project included for
a term of years the cessation of our fisheries
to the United States, the enlargement
of our canals, the free enjoyment of the
navigation of the St. Lawrence, and ex-
emption of our customs and excise
duties, and some other propositions."

No one attempted to dispute Mr.
Brown's statement. The question is, if
discrimination against England was not
disloyal in itself twenty years ago, why
should it be so now? Since 1869 the
market of the United States has become
incomparably valuable as a mart for
Canadian trade. The thirty odd millions
then have become over sixty millions
now, and the individual and national
wealth of the country has grown at least
in equal proportion. Moreover, whilst

they were up to their eyes in debt then
and we but lightly burdened, a change
has come over the scene, and we, not
they, are now staggering under a load.
For these and other reasons, free trade
with our neighbors is far more desirable
today than ever before; and when the
Canadian people shall make up their
minds to ask for it, we may be sure,
as the Times said, that the Mother
Country will not seek to hinder us from
benefiting ourselves.
