Below is the interesting notice: RECIPROcity WILL INCREASE CANADIAN LANDS 100 PER CENT. Canadian Pacific Railway Land Department.

The contention has frequently been made that Reciprocity would increase the price of lands, but it remained for the Canadian Pacific Railway, about the shrewdest land dealers in the business, to fix the exact increase in the price. This increase, the C.P.R. intimates, will come as soon as Reciprocity is passed.

And in this case the C.P.R. is probably right. It will find no person in this western country who will seriously dispute with it over this. It is an interesting argument.

The enhancement of land value in the Canadian West as a result of the passing of the reciprocity agreement is fully recognized on the other side of the line. **CALGARY HORSE WILL GO ON GRAND CIRCUIT**

George Haug Will Match Alberts Against the Best on the Track. Horse Wins Alberta Record on Edmonton Track Exhibition Week.

Calgary, Sept. 11.—Calgary is to have another fast one in the grand circuit races this season. Alberts, 2:09 1/4, will be our outstanding horse, who brought fame to this city with his good horse General H. last year, will pilot our new representative.

Alberta was bought from Red MacIntyre after a long meeting by George Haug. The Manitoba horseman was disgusted with the showing which the bay made at the races in the prairie city, but Haug knew a good thing when he saw it, and will enter the horse in the grand circuit.

The horse is now owned by I. G. F. and after giving him time to recuperate he sent him a good race at Regina ahead of 4 fast field, and later on he made a track record of 2:09 1/4.

Alberta has the appearance of an ideal racing machine, and when he gave his exhibition mile here Labor Day, the spectators were surprised at the burst of speed he showed and the apparent ease with which he receded off the mile. He is of light build and does not carry any extra weight, but his stamina is undoubted, and now that Haug has the handling of this horse, Calgaryans will look with great interest on his performances at Columbus, where he starts in his grand circuit career. Later he will enter the races at Syracuse, Hartford (where General H. made his reputation), Lexington, and later in the season at Phoenix, Ariz.

**ERUPTION OF MT. ETNA IS MORE INTENSE**

Reported That Three New Craters Have Opened—Women and Children Are Without Shelter—Patients Carried Out of Building.

Sicily, Sept. 11.—The eruption of Mount Etna has become more intense. The showers of ashes and cinders and the falling of the earth's shocks at short intervals is heard for miles. The shocks are growing in violence and a panic prevails. The fear of the people is augmented by the great heat. All the country round about is covered with ashes.

It is reported that three new craters have opened, but so far it has been impossible to ascertain whether they are emitting lava, because of their being situated in the shadow of the volcano. People of the villages on the slopes of Mount Etna have abandoned their homes.

Several houses have been damaged by the earthquakes and hundreds of men, women and children, who are without shelter, go about from place to place carrying pictures of the saints crying and imploring mercy.

At Giarrata, sixteen miles from Catania, the patients were carried out of the building would collapse.

**SYNOD DISCUSSES NE TEMERE DECREE**

Two Motions Introduced, One Calling for Joint Committee of Upper and Lower House to Outlaw Necessary Legislation to Remedy Evil.

London, Ont., Sept. 11.—The ne temere decree was brought up in the general session of the Anglican Church this morning when Hon. P. S. Blake, Toronto, introduced two motions to the house.

The first called for the appointment of a joint committee of the upper and lower houses to inquire into the matter with six other denominations and to outline the necessary legislation for the remedying of the existing evil. The second was a memorial to the government asking for special legislation to set aside the court of exchequer for the hearing of cases touching the validity of marriage.

The motions were opposed by Dr. Davidson, L.L.B., of Montreal, and James Jones, K.C. of Toronto, who said that the ne temere decree did not affect Canadian civil marriage laws. It was the civil law of Quebec, declared Mr. Jones, that was responsible for the ruin of the Quebec people.

**BUCHANAN BEING WELL RECEIVED EVERYWHERE**

Liberal Candidate in Medicine Hat Has a Support of 75 Per Cent. of the Strong Voters—Dr. King of the Royal Veterinary.

Letbridge, Sept. 12.—W. A. Buchanan is having a most successful reception of meetings at Letbridge. A big crowd turned out on Saturday to the meeting. The same reception is accorded to the reciprocity candidate everywhere. At least eighty per cent. of the voters are for Buchanan.

Dr. King, Liberal candidate in Kootenai, had a wonderful reception in Cranbrook, his home town, on Tuesday. The crowd met him at the station and accompanied him to the meeting. The largest auditorium in the place was filled to overflowing at the evening meeting. His chances of placing A. S. Goddard are getting more like a certainty every day.

**J.A. LOCKERBIE THROWS OUT A CHALLENGE**

Mr. J. A. Lockerbie was interviewed last evening by the Bulletin in regard to the statement in yesterday evening's Journal that fourteen boxes were being sent to the C.P.R. by the returning officer on account of the haps.

Mr. Lockerbie stated that these boxes were rejected before the Thistle rink meeting but asserted that in his opinion they were perfectly safe and that he was willing to pay one thousand dollars to any person who could improperly open any of the ballot boxes made by him in the manner in which W. A. Griesbach opened the ballot box in the Thistle rink.

He stated that such was quite impossible as the wire at the base of the lid was in one piece with a joint at the back.

**MAINE REPEALS PROHIBITION.**

Portland, Me., Sept. 11.—Unofficial and only partly revised returns from 493 out of 521 cities, towns and villages in Maine today gave a majority of 904 for repeal of the prohibition constitutional amendment. The opposing 22 towns cast less than 385 votes at the state election three years ago.

Armed Clash is Feared.

Victoria, B.C., Sept. 10.—The Oracle last night brought news that an armed clash is anticipated between Chinese and Portuguese authorities at Mackay over a border dispute. The trouble is being brought to a city by the resumption of dredging operations by the Portuguese in the disputed area.

**FATAL CLASH IN MEXICO.**

Mexico City, Sept. 10.—Nine persons were killed and more than twice that number wounded when Royalists and Maderistas clashed yesterday in Taxila Chilo, a village in the state of Chiapas, near the southern boundary of Mexico, according to reports received at the president's office.
