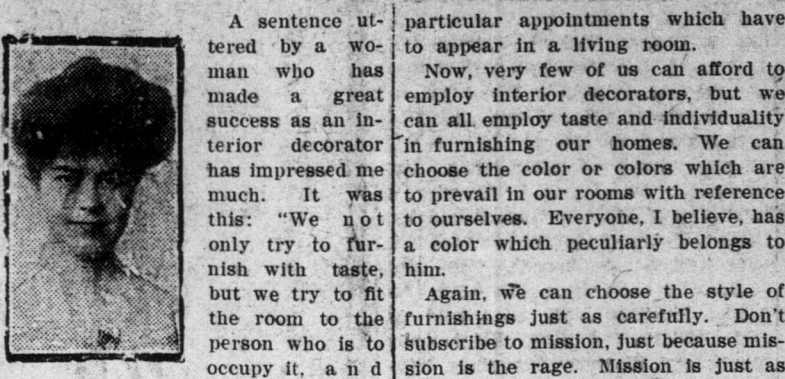

How many rooms one enters, in which it is evident that no such effort to embody the individuality of the occupant in the furnishings of the room, has been made. Little after touches, such as the presence of magazines or music, the lavish distribution of embroideries, the nature of the rows of books on the book-shelves, may suggest and depict to us, the character of the persons who inhabit the room, but in the actual furnishings themselves, there is frequently no relation to those persons. Mission was in style when this room was furnished, and so the room consists of so many set pieces of mission. Circassian walnut was all the rage when that couple married, and therefore, their slender purse had to be stretched to purchase a few interior and artistic pieces of the reigning wood.

The woman who blindly follows the dictates of fashion in gowning herself, with a complete indifference as to whether the particular style is becoming or not, is quite generally censured. I believe that the woman who furnishes her home—for it usually is the woman who has the most time, the most interest, and hence the deciding voice in this matter—with like devotion to fashion and indifference to individuality, is equally at fault.

Canned Air.

Nearly everything is successfully canned now—or "tinned," as they say in England. Canned air is the newest thing to be added to the many varieties. The Jaden Londoner piping for a breath of really fresh air no longer need rush off to the seaside for his ozone. Every station of the Central London Railway will soon have its own apparatus for mixing electrically produced ozone with the atmosphere at the platform level and in the adjoining "tube," so that its patrons can enjoy the health-giving elements while travelling to and from their offices.

At the Bank Station, recently equipped with the patent ozone mixing system of ventilation, six thousand to seven thousand cubic feet of ozonized air are pumped into the station and its adjoining "tube" every minute from seven in the morning until one o'clock at night. As a result the acrid, dampish odor so noticeable in some of the earlier-huilt "tube" systems has utterly disappeared.

What look like two large wooden packing boxes, perched on the roof of the booking office, contain all the apparatus necessary for the revivification of the "tube's" atmosphere. A couple of square yards of cocoanut matting, kept wet by a constant stream of water trickling over it, acts as a filter through which air is sucked into one of these large wooden boxes by a vacuum pump. This screens from the air all the contained dust, soot and microbes. The purified air is then carried to a main ventilating shaft, where it is mixed with the ozone.

The ozone is produced in the second box, where by another suction pump a continuous stream of air is drawn across a space through which a high-tension electric current is passing. In the process ozone is formed, and this, mixed with the filtered fresh air, is pumped down to the platform level, where it is distributed through a dozen ventilators. A portion of the ozone-laden air is also carried along in a large galvanized iron pipe to empty into the tunnel forty feet from its entrance.—The Boston Transcript.

Household Notes.

Turnips are liked better by many persons if they are parboiled and drained before the final cooking. A little potato added to mashed turnips is a pleasing variety.

When a fabric loses its color in washing, it may frequently be restored by sponging the material with ammonia and water. If this fails, vinegar may be effective.

A rich puff paste baked in strips about an inch wide and two or three inches long, is very good in sandwiches. Guava jelly and whipped cream are used for filling.

Paint stains may be removed from woollen fabrics by rubbing with turpentine. If the stains are old and do not respond to this treatment, add ammonia to the turpentine.

When postcard photographs curl and become brittle, rub them over with a cloth dipped in a cupful of water to which a teaspoonful of glycerine has been added, to soften them.

A thin coat of potash left on the sink overnight once a week will remove the ugly yellow stains that will not yield to kerosene. It should be applied with care, as it is poisonous.

When the mayonnaise separates in the making, add a little of the white of the egg and continue adding the other ingredients. In almost every case the separation will be overcome.

The best thing to dust furniture is a large, soft paint brush which has been dipped in olive oil and squeezed almost dry. This will take up every bit of dust without sending it flying about.

Housekeepers who get butter in the jar or tub will find that the use of a little charcoal will insure having the butter sweet. The charcoal is placed in a paper bag and then put into the jar.

An apple pie made without the upper crust is a pleasing change. Line the pie plate and bake the under crust; fill with apple sauce, seasoned to taste, and cover the top with whipped cream.

Cold bluefish or almost any cold fish, except coarse fish, like salt cod, may be utilized for salad. Season with plenty of salad dressing, thin slices of young onions and minced parsley. Serve on a bed of lettuce.
