#### The Explosion in N. Y. Financial District. NEW YORK, Sept. 16.

A mysterious explosion this noon in Wall Street, near Broadway, is believed by trained United States De-partment of Justice and Police Investigators to have been caused by an infernal machine, rocked part of New York's financial district, leaving death and destruction in its wake. At least twenty persons were killed and more than two hundred were injured in the banking house of J. P. the physician at Brixton prison declared no change in Mac-

speeding through the narrow streets. Dressing stations were established in lobbies of buildings nearby, where the less seriously injured were given immediate treatment. Evidence to confirm the theory that the explosion was caused by bomb or some other infernal machine came from several sources. Pieces of the slugs used in the bombs were found in several adjacent structures. This type of weight bars, on close inspection by the police and Department of Justice agents disclosed, is not used in any building within radius of several hundred feet from the scene of the explosion. Mr. Burns, who said he had been engaged by the Morgan firm to make an investigation of the accident, stated that his personal investigation convinced him that a wagon containing a bomb or bombs was left in front of the sub-Treasury building with timing device so fixed

as to cause it to explode precisely at noon. No trace of the driver of the wagon has been found he said, and added that in his opinion the man escaped a few moments before the ex-plosion occurred. Fire Chief Kenlon and officers from Bureau of Combustiand omcers from Bureau of Combusti-bles, also expressed the belief that the explosion was caused by bomb. After examining fragments of metal found in front of Morgan's offices, Dr. William F. 
