

### Three Ears For Drivers.

Motorists are now able to use an additional means of hearing oncoming and overtaking traffic.

An instrument has been devised by which the sound coming from behind is caught by a large funnel-shaped drum at the rear of the car and the noise conveyed along a tube to the driver's ear. The front "ear-piece" is so shaped that the air currents, striking it from the front as the car moves along are diverted, making a sort of vacuum, caused by suction.

By this means the sounds from the rear are drawn in more rapidly and are intensified just where the chauffeur is sitting.
