

Super-Giant Plane.

Like a Ship With Tiers of Wings.

A new wonder ship of the air—a giant of giants—bore a fresh era in design, is taking shape now to the order of the Government in a huge shed at Bristol.

Viewed even from a distance the colossal looks astonishingly large. Seen close at hand, with the framework of its tiers of wings, as yet uncovered, stretching one above another, either side of its tremendous hull, the machine almost takes one's breath away.

Gone is the day of aeroplanes as we have pictured them hitherto. This machine wants a new name. Its body makes one think of the slim lines of a speedy sea vessel. Then, when you are inside it, the impression is rather that of some Pullman-car express on a storied scale. But it is not really like a ship or any such vehicle. Those working on it merely call it an "aerial transport."

It may be used to carry troops; it is big enough to act as a tender for a squadron of aeroplanes, carrying fuel and spare parts for them; it may be fitted up as a Red Cross craft of the air and have the lofty main saloon equipped as an operating theatre.

Standing under the shadow of the machine he is creating, Mr. Reid, the Bristol Aeroplane Company's designer, and his band of skilled workers look like mankind.

Engine-Room Like a Ship's. There is an engine-room inside the monster's hull. Bunched here at last is that "amateurish" scheme of dotting motors with their propellers out some where on wings where they are inaccessible. Here there is a battery of engines, with their many gleaming cylinders, grouped in orderly precision; and what makes the expert power—such a system of gearing and power transmission as has never been tried to any degree even before.

It is from this engine-room that the power will be transmitted to propellers in the wings; and if the experiment succeeds it will open up a completely new field. There is talk, for instance, already, of obtaining a number of the huge 1,000-h.p. aero engines now reaching perfection and using them for an enormous craft which may surpass our wildest dreams.

Repairs in Flight. This Bristol giant will fly by night and day. The peril of a forced landing—that bugbear of the aeroplane—is practically eliminated. If any portion of the power-plant gives trouble here will be mechanics in the engine-room to put it right while the machine is in the air, the other working units being accelerated meanwhile to give the power sufficient to maintain altitude and speed.

Nothing could be more reassuring, with the flying world under the shadow of the R-88 disaster, than to see this latest marvel of British aircraft design. —Daily Mail.

Capt. Hayes an Indian Chief.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The Olympic arrived here last night after the longest trip of her career. She encountered a gale of hurricane force which raged for three days.

Among her passengers was Dask, chief of the Caraga tribe of Indians of Ontario, who was returning from London, where he lodged a protest against the Canadian law, recently passed, making the Indians citizens of the province they live in.

The skipper said it was, and the chief registered much contempt. "I give you lot more," he said, and upon he created Captain Hayes, chief of the Caraga tribe, of Ontario. "Tak-Nya-Dy-Yes," he said, "this says the chief means 'man who crosses big water.'"

Shoppers Make \$100,000 a Year.

Further details of the "smugglers' paradise" in the Bahama Islands are given by the New York Herald, whose special correspondent has been spending several weeks in the little British archipelago seeing the mechanism of the great supply system for satisfying the parched American throat.

Writes the New York correspondent of the London Daily Mail: "Since liquor became more than half of its total trade, the correspondent adds, 'the colony has become rich, and is the only British colony about a public debt.'"

Settlement Point, at the extremity of the archipelago, which is only 40 miles from the American coast, is one of the chief smuggling haunts.

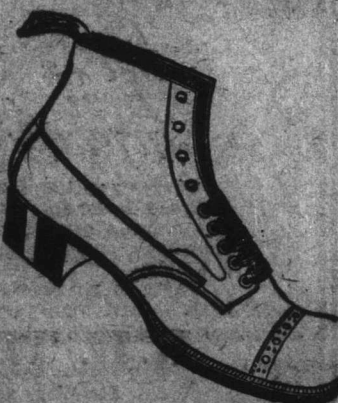

Mrs. Spiker came to be known as the "forgiving wife" from the kindly and affectionate welcome she gave the girl. In the end Miss Knowles became engaged to Mr. Guy Spiker, the brother of her baby's father, and they were married.

Sacreligious Thieves.

INVADE SANCTITY OF ALTAR.

Rome (Associated Press).—The "Sacred Bambino" of the Church of Holy Mary of the Victory has been stolen but recovered. It is the revered image of the Infant Jesus by Praga, and is believed by many Italians to possess the miraculous power of effecting cures among the people who worshipped at its shrine. So revered was it that hundreds of pieces of jewelry were placed at its feet, draped about its body and placed in close proximity to it as marks of gratitude from the faithful who were convinced they had received healing. One morning lately, the thieves gained access to the altar where the "Bambino" is placed, and made away with jewels and everything. Discovery that the adored image was not at its accustomed place was the signal for a general alarm and hundreds of devout persons, in the neighborhood of the church, made their pilgrimages to the altar to pray for the restoration of the "Bambino." During the day, one of the thieves was caught and this led to recovery of the revered "Bambino." The Church of Holy Mary of the Victory was erected to commemorate the victory of Lepanto, when the Crusaders defeated the Turks at sea. It is just in the shadow of the American embassy.

Delawana and Bluenose Enter for Race.

LUNenburg, September 23.—Both the Delawana and the Bluenose, although they have not yet officially entered for the elimination, will be among the Lunenburg contestants for the honour of representing Canada in the International Fishing Schooner Race to be held off Halifax 25th of October. It is known here to-day, The Delawana was defeated in the International races last year by the Esperanto of Gloucester. W. C. Smith and Company of this town are her managing owners. She is now in Halifax discharging fish.

The Bluenose will go on the Marline Slip here next week to be put into condition for the race, and the Delawana, it is expected, will remain in Halifax and be overhauled at that port. It is also reported that the Canada, of Lunenburg, the first entry, will go up to Halifax next week to prepare for the elimination contest. There is every possibility of a number of other Lunenburg County vessels entering the elimination races. Enthusiasm is steadily growing, and every day brings forth new aspirants for winning the honors of the elimination races on the 15th of October. H. R. Silver, Chairman of the International Trophy Trustees, is now in town.

Three Ears For Drivers.

Motorists are now able to use an additional means of hearing oncoming and overtaking traffic.

An instrument has been devised by which the sound coming from behind is caught by a large funnel-shaped drum at the rear of the car and the notes conveyed along a tube to the driver's ear. The front "ear-piece" is so shaped that the air currents, striking it from the front as the car moves along are diverted, making a sort of vacuum, caused by suction.

By this means the sounds from the rear are drawn in more rapidly and are intensified just where the chauffeur is sitting. Charabancs largely utilize these "charaphones," as the new invention is named, for it is very difficult for their drivers to see or hear behind, owing to the enormous size of the vehicle.
