Old St. Paul's Chart ard, Trinity, Every time I go i to he old Churchyard in Trinity, prented to give time and energy to careful investigati of the headstones, etc., there, I find something interesting, and often something interesting, and something surprising. For several years I had decided that the stone bearing the date 1748 was the oldest. Then later I found one with the date 1747, and still later, one with the date 1745. This week, however, taking advantage of the Church-yard fencebuilders' pick and shovel, I dug up some other half-buried stones, only to find all my other dates superseder by one perpetuating the death of Jonah Newell, Sr., in 1743.

The finding of this date, which had been looking for so long (as the Church Registers go back only to 1753) has enabled me to decide tha this Jonah Newell, Sr., who died in Sr., who died in 1724, and that Jonah Newell, Jr., who died in 1799, aged 71 years, was a son of Jonah Newell.


