Bishop of Birmingham

English papers to hand by last mail contain many appreciative references to the appointment of Canon E. W. Barnes, of Westminster Abbey, as Bishop of Birmingham, in succession to Bishop Wakefield, who recently resigned owing to age and falling health. The London Times and the Sunday Times are particularly happy in their endorsement of the appointment of Bishop Barnes, who is looked upon as one of the ablest minds in the Church of England to-day. The following is from the Times:—

"The new Bishop of Birmingham is Canon Barnes of Westminster, who is a Doctor of Science and Fellow of the Royal Society. Dr. Barnes was educated at the famous Birmingham School, King Edward's, before he went up to Cambridge; and not only this local association but the quality of his mind makes the appointment peculiarly suitable. When Dr. Barnes was appointed Master of the Temple in September, 1915, it was recognized that tradition had been broken in deference to intellectual attainments which placed him among the leading men of pure science of the day. He then had no parochial experience, and apart from that of examining chaplain of the Bishop of London, had held no clerical office. But the confidence of his Cambridge friends, who predicted that he would soon count as one of the greater forces in the spiritual life of London, was speedily more than fulfilled. From the pulpits of the Temple and the Abbey, which he was made a Canon in 1918, he has exerted a steady increasing influence as a preacher and as a student of current affairs. At Trinity his career was one of exceptional distinction. He was bracketed as Second Wrangler in 1896, and in 1897—the year in which he was President of the Union—was placed in the First Division of the First Class in the Mathematical Tripos, Part II. Next year he was first Smith's Prizesman, was elected to a Fellowship of Trinity, and was appointed instructor at the Royal Military Academy, Woolrich. He was ordained in 1902, and is now in his 50th year."

"The appointment of Canon Barnes to the Bishopric of Birmingham is particularly felicitous," says the Sunday Times. "It is so partly because the new Bishop is himself a Birmingham man, and has kept up his association with his old school where his instinct for mathematics was first developed. But it is also a happy appointment because Birmingham has long been a city with a striking religious life, and Bishop Barnes is the man to make it as prominent in the Church of England as Dawson and Dale and Jowett made it in English Nonconformity."

"He is still only fifty, and it is not yet twenty-two years since he was ordained. But among the younger men of the Church he has made a distinctive mark as one who touches with the life and thought of our time, and a preacher and student who combines faith and a high scientific intelligence with the courage of a modern outlook. It is men of his type that the Church needs more than ever now if she is not to see the forces that are shaping a new England, escape from her altogether."
