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Eastern Ringside Gossip

The Britton thinks that he can polish off all of these prospective opponents in a 10-round bout, after which he will give any or all of these prospective mates a 20-round battle in California, if the promoters on the coast will bid.

Welsh defeated Cross on points several years ago, when Leach wasn't an expected heavyweight.
