In order to embarrass the Government assets of the computation of the computati to embarrass the Government, some of the Opposition talk of promoting a struggle in the Commons in favor of compulsion; but this is only in hope of securing the ear of the Ulster men. A good deal of interest attaches to what after all will be the Government scheme. It will not be surprising if it be based on Sir G. O. Trevelan's proposals of May, 1884, when it was suggested that £20,000,000 should be advanced, not more than £5,000,000 in one year. Since then nearly £10,000,000 has been exhausted under Ashbourne's Act. Possibly the Government will limit further supply to another £10,000,000, which, at £5,000,000 a year, will provide sufficient to carry the measure till the general election.
