

A Good Chance to Catch Up With the Times.

Easy for Workers to Get a Good Education in Spare Moments.

A Visit to One of the Evening Schools and What Was Seen There.

The educational system of the city of London is now recognized as being among the best in the Province of Ontario. Thu is the view held by professional men, tourists, and men and women interested in the welfare of the rising generation. The Board of Education has again shown its determination to keep apace with the needs of the times by opening public night

schools for the winter months. Night schools are now looked upon as an absolute necessity by the majority of people. In these prevailing hard times hundreds of men are out of employment, and therefore nothing remains but that the children should be deprived of complete education and sent to work in a factory or store of some description at an early age. These are the people for whose special penefit the schools have been opened.

Au ADVERTISER representative paid a visit to the Colborne street school the other evening, and there found two large classes, the senior under Mr. W. F. May, the new principal at Park street, and the junior under Mr. S. T. Latta, lately appointed on the permanent teaching staff of the city. Each of these classes has on the roll up wards of 90 names, and the average attendance in each is about 70. The ages of the scholars are anywhere from 10 to 25. Some of the boys are so small that they can hardly reach the desk: while there are big fellows whose chins are getting dark and rough and who have added to the burdens of life that of raising a young mustache. Pupils received at 415 commendable in them that they should wish to better themselves as best they can under the circumstances. Some of them have passed the high school entrance; some cannot read or write; some are boisterous at times and some are quiet. As a rule, however, they are attentive in their studies

and make good progress. The principal subjects for the lower form are reading, writing and arithmetic-the simpler forms in the latter, merely to rub the rust off and prepare the pupils for the higher grade. The first haf hour is consumed in arithmetic. The problems are written on the blackboard, and sufficient time is given for their solution. The teacher then marks them out, and in most cases the scholars can work out the answer-if they don't they make a desperate effort to succeed. The bookkeeping is dealt with in the same way. and the result is a good practical business
