LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

have been issued so far.

—Mrs. Thomas Sutherland, of Port
Huron, is visiting in this city.—Corporation laborers to-day drew
\$186 90 for the last week's work.—Miss Emma Smith, of Richmond street
north, left this morning for Detroit.—A correspondent would like to learn
the present address of the Rev. Pierre B.
de Lom, formerly of this city, but more re-
cently of London, Eng.—Hop Sing has sold out his Dundas
street business and will leave for China
next week to visit his father and mother.
He will probably return.—Commencing to-day bakers have raised
the price of bread from 4 to 5 cents a loaf.
They say that at 4 cents there is absolutely
no profit, and that they have been forced
to take the loss.—The Windsor Record says the drill
class there is making splendid progress and
its members are highly delighted with their
instructor, the sergeant-major of
Wolseley Barracks, this city.—Fred. E. Holmes and Dr. Stewart will
leave on their wheels in about two weeks
for London, Ont., and return. They in-
tend to make the round trip in about eight
hours, providing the doctor does not give
up the ghost. [Port Huron Times.]—The work of the I. O. F. order in
Europe has increased to such a degree of
late as to require the presence of the
supreme chief ranger for a time, and it is
expected that Dr. Oronhyatekha will leave
about the 25th of this month for England.—John Harris, a crippled man, was
passed to London from Stratford this morn-
ing in hopes of admission to the hospital.
He did not succeed in getting into the hos-
pital, and, as he said he had friends in
Midland and Hamilton, he was passed east
as far as Woodstock.—At yesterday afternoon's session of the
National Council of Women of Canada,
Mrs. Tilley read a paper on "Nursing of
the poor in their own homes." Mrs.
Boomer read a paper explaining the
problem of "Domestic Service," from the
mistress' point of view.—At the quarterly meeting of St.
George's Society last night a committee
was appointed to look after the annual
banquet on April 23. Resolutions for the
quarter were \$45, expenses \$84 90. There
is a balance of \$4 25 on hand. One new
life member—Mr. Arthur Hunt—was re-
ceived.—The proposed new game law protects
partridges, snipe and woodcock from shot-
guns until Sept. 15, 1897, and quail or wild
