In Sending Inmates to the Middlesex Poorhouse.

The inspector of the Strathroy House of Refuge this afternoon presented his annual to report for the year ending Nov. 15, 1893, to the Middlesex County Council. From it are gleaned many interesting statistics. Of the various townships in this county Biddulph contributes the largest number of inmates, sending 15, while Adelaide follows close with 14, some of the remaining places sending as few as one. At present there are 111 persons confined in the institution, of whom 31 were admitted during the year. The causes of the pauperism of the inmates are numerous, some being the results of sickness; but, as is the case very often, liquor sends the largest contingent. The causes are as follows: Intemperance, 32; homeless, 26; old age, 11; weak intellect, 11; loss of property, 5; cripples, 4; sickness, 10; loss of sight, 2; born in the retuge, 1; other causes, 6.

In the maintenance account, the labor item runs up to \$589 65, salaries of keeper and matron, \$525 04; physician and mediciens, \$303 33; light and fuel, \$1,035 95, and provisions \$1,806 86, which with other amounts totals up \$10,213 43. The average cost of each immate per day has been very low, only reaching 20 1-100 cents, with interest on capital added of 26 7-10 cents per day.

ning, of the year was real estate valued at \$33,609 S7, since which time, however, has been added to the institution furniture and improvements of all kinds made, which will swell the amount to nearly \$40,000.
