Spain Must Act Quickly

Or the Terms of Peace May Be Cairneross & Lawrence. Withdrawn.

Hourly in Washington

Peace Negotiations No Bar to Sending Reinforcements to General Miles.

U. S. Marines in Better Health Than When They First Arrived in Cuba -Blanco Drops His Bombast.

Washington, Aug. 8.—Although as yet without official confirmation of the report from Paris that the Spanish government has decided to accept the terms laid down by the United States, the officials here are proceeding under the conviction that the end has come, and are giving attention to the steps to be taken next. In view of the delay, the idea was beginning to prevail that the Spanish government was about to enter a plea in abatement, and that the answer would again be inconclusive. In this case the president was disposed to deal firmly with the issue; to give notice that our proposals were withdrawn, and to let it be understood that when Spain again sued for peace the conditions would be more severe than those first laid down. If the Span-

the foreign minister and re-approved by the queen and cabinet, it accepts without discussing the four preliminary conditions of peace imposed by the

But care is taken to explain that Spain gives way to the force of events, again asserting that she had neither sought nor done anything to provoke the war into which she was driven by the conduct of America.

Nothing is said about a Cuban debt. The note suggests a suspension of hostilities in order to effect the subsequent negotiations, and offers to appoint commissioners to act with the American commissioners to determine what shall be done with reference to the Philippine Islands.

The Spanish peace commissioners if is generally believed, will be the Duke of Almedovar, the minister of foreign affairs, Mgr. Merry Del Val, the Spanish ambassador to the Vatican; and Senor Leon y Castillo, the Spanish ambassador at Paris.

SANCTIONED BY THE QUEEN. The Madrid Government's response to the ultimatum was sanctioned in substance by the queen regent vesterday, and the first draft of it, as supmitted to her by Premier Sagasta, was approved by the cabinet last night. It then was referred to the foreign minister for revision and to be put in conventional diplomatic form and phrased before the final council of ministers pass upon it. The Duke of Almadovar crossed the court to the royal apartments and placed before the queen regent the momentous document which gives official assent of spain to the loss of the last remnant of her empire in the new world. Both the queen and the minister were deeply moved. Then the duke conveyed the document to the council, at which the ministers also showed their sense of the painful, mournful solemnity of the occasion imposed by nesessity upon the

rulers of Spain. The note should be handed to President McKinley this morning or Tuesday morning, which will allow of a suspension of bostili-ties before the middle of the week. VIA PARIS. It was telegraphed before midnight to

war will permit. BLANCO BECOMING BLAND. New York, Aug. 8 .- According to advices received from Havana by the Cuba Junta, Captain General Blanco realizes the fact that he must soon withdraw himself and forces from the Island of Cuba. He has assumed a mild attitude and is treating the insurgents with great consideration. In a recent proclamation he made known to the Spanish people of Cuba that Spain, through the intervention of foreign powers, had been forced to the disgraceful issue of suing for peace, and that there would be no more war and no further use for soldiers. He offered a pardon to all Cuban politi-

cal prisoners, and more than 150 were released in Havana. In explaining Spain's defeat, Captain-General Blanco says that Spain, having suffered so much in the present war, could not resist the interference of the foreign powers, and go to war with all the countries at once, so she was compelled to accede to their dictation and sue for peace. Havana, he says, will be given over to Americans and Cubans, and the Spaniards will be forced to evacuate. Capt.-Gen. Blanco assures the soldiers and all Spanish residents who wish to return to Spain or other Spanish possessions, that they will get free transportation, given by their mother country, to their destination, and will be protected from interference on the part of either Cubans or Americans. He suggested that the Cubans be forgiven, and no longer regarded as enemies, and no unkind feelings be cherished

THE APPLE CROP

Prospects Favorable for a Fair Average Yield.

The Montreal Trade Bulletin says: Although the abundant show of blossoms last spring caused many to jump to the conclusion that the Canadian apple crop of 1898 would be the largest in the history of the trade, subsequent conditions have compelled a modification of first reports, but from more recent estimates of parties in the trade since the fruit on the trees had developed to nearly its normal size, the prospects are favorable for a fair average yield. Regarding the English crop

a London firm writes as follows, under date of July 18, 1898: "Judging from the reports so far received, England, Scotland and Wales will have a short crop, and will require large quantities of Canadian and American apples during the coming season. The continent will have a fair crop of early fruit, but imports from these are not expected to he heavy."

Advices from New York state that the Western and Southwestern States will have a short crop, while the Eastern States will have a much larger crop than that of 1897. If New York State has the abundant yield that was predicted a short time ago, it will compensate in a great measure for the short crop in the west.

Their Convention at Close Halifax.

The Resolutions They Adopted - Ottawa the Next Meeting Place.

Halifax, Aug. 7.-The Dominion Educational Association closed Friday. It was decided that the next meeting should be held in the city of Ottawa in the year 1900. The following officers were elected on the recommendation of the nominating committee: Dr. Mac-Cabe, Ottawa, president; Hon. Dr. De Labuer, of Quebec; Hon. Dr. Ross, of Toronto; Dr. MacKay, of Halifax, Dr. Inch, of New Brunswick; Dr. J. Mc-Leod, of Prince Edward Island; Hon. J. D.
