SETILING DOWN.

Wall Street Getting Over Its Panic Caused by the President's Message —Few Failures.

New York, Dec. 22.-Wall street, especially in the immediate vicinity of the stock exchange, is ordinarily, on a Saturday afternoon, one of the least frequented and most quiet streets in New York. Yesterday, however, almost until evening, crowds of people thronged the neighboring streets and groups of members of the exchange, members of the press and curbstone brokers were gathered in Wall, Broad and Nassau streets and Exchange place, discussing the happenings of the day. The general im-pression was the extreme tension had been relaxed and that, with reasonable leniency on the part of the banks, a quieting down would occur on Monday.

The great open question confronting the financial community will be that of the probable extent of the withdrawals of gold rom the sub-treasury for shipment by the mid-week steamer. Estimates range as high as \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000, but no definite information was obtainable. Wm. Sherer, manager of the New York

clearing house, thought the talk of war a mistake, and said that the amount of money lost during the last two days would have purchased the whole Venezuelan territory in dispute.

Although there have been heavy losses throughout the list the speculation has been more conservative than on Friday, and save for two unimportant failures, there were no disastrous movements, and prices have been sustained more strongly than had been anticipated.

WHOLESALE CIDER BLAZE.

Three Thousand Barrels Burned in Norwich-Big Blaze in St. Kits.

Norwich, Ont., Dec. 22. - S. Allen's vinegar works were destroyed by fire yes-Total loss \$40,000; insurance \$14,000. Three thousand barrels of cider were destroyed.

St. Catharines, Ont., Dec. 22.-Early resterday fire destroyed a large part of Patterson & Corbin's car factory. The machine shop, cabinet shop, and paint shop, which were contained in the middle building of the three large buildings were completely gutted, and a large quantity of valuable machinery was destroyed. For-tunately a number of cars built for the London Street Railway, valued at \$2,000 each, were in the other shop, nearest Geneva street, and were untouched. Mr Patterson estimates the loss at about \$10,000, and on the building there was an insurance of \$6,000 or \$7,000. The principal loss is from the machinery and the car fittings.
