THE BATTLE OF THE BRUISERS

Sharkey Failed to Down Champion Jeffries.

An Immense Crowd Witnessed the Twenty-Five Rounds of Slugging-Racing Events at New York, Chicago and Newport, Ky.

JEFFRIES STILL CHAMPION.
Coney Island Sporting Club, New York, Nov. 4.—James J. Jeffries retains the championship of the world, Referee George Siler giving him the decision at the end of the 25th round over Tom Sharkey at the Coney Island Sporting Club last night. The crowd was the greatest that ever gathered in the Coney Island clubhouse. In five rounds Jeffries had the better of the fight in the first two and in the last three. During the other twenty Sharkey forced the issue, and, like a ferocious bull, was at his man with both hands continuously. In the 20th round Jeffries' great weight and brawn helped him to hold off the sailor, and in the 22nd round he swung in a couple of vicious uppercuts that rattled the boxer. Tom came back again in the 24th and 25th, but he was weakened greatly by Jeffries' vicious blows. One minute before the gong sounded to end the fight Jeffries' left foot came off, and practically the contest was over. The referee motioned to Jeffries' corner, a flag was hung around the champion's shoulders, the crowd took that side and end of the arena on that side and the crowd on the opposite side and end, in Sharkey's corner, yelled for Sharkey, and the men were led back to their dressing-rooms. The thousands that gathered were banded 40 feet high around the building; the place was packed from ringside to rafters. The aisles around the ring were lined. The tremendous crowd swayed under the glare of 400 arc lights, fifteen feet from the canvas of the squared circle. The heat was intense, and the fighters were almost exhausted and the spectators shrieked themselves hoarse.

It seemed at first as though it would be a short fight, for in the second round Jeffries put the sailor to the ropes with a left on the jaw, and the referee began to call off the seconds as Sharkey knelt on the floor. But from this round on, Sharkey, with his vicious swings to the ribs and the jaw, kept the crowd on its feet waiting for a knock-out. Jeffries stood the terrific punishment, and with his eye, nose and ear split, came back as victorious.

OBJECT TO DOUBLE TAXES

Certain Citizens Said To Be Charged Excessive Sewer Rates—An Asset of \$12,000 Involved.

The finance committee met last night and discussed the liability of citizens who have been paying for the building of some 37 old trunk sewers. Ald. Carrothers contends that these ratepayers, now that the old sewers are incorporated into the new system, should be relieved of whatever portion of their cost remains to be met. Otherwise they would be paying double rates. Capitalized, the asset is \$12,000.

On motion of Ald. Plant, the city solicitor's opinion re the transfer of that amount from the trunk sewer debenture fund will be obtained.
