But he was unable to make any positive statement on that subject. The Russian Russian diplo government, he added, had informed the brink of the government of Great Britain that Russia had no intention of withdrawing from co-operating with the other

powers in China. THE CONCESSION TO RUSSIA. Questioned in regard to the conces sion to the Russians at Tien Tsin, Lord Cranborne said: "Li Hung Chang signed an agreement granting Russia a considerable tract of land, which the Russian military authorities had previously claimed by right of conquest. The British foreign office was not aware by what authority Li Hung Chang signed the concession, but the Chinese government had declared its validity, and therefore it must be reserved for future
