

MANY JUNKS GET INTO PORT ARTHUR

One in Three Succeed in Eluding the Japanese.

ARE OPERATED BY AMERICANS

Last Vessel to Make Harbor Nearly Sunk—Business Is Proving Very Lucrative.

London, Tuesday, Nov. 8.—The Che 300 correspondent of the Express says that despite the Japanese precautions Chinese junk boats are still making their way into Port Arthur. The latest junk to arrive got into the port on Nov. 1, while a bombardment was in progress. A shell exploded within a few feet of her as she was passing Tiger's Tail. The junk was laden with supplies brought from an American agent by the Russian consul at Tien Tsin. More than six firms are making vast fortunes by running the blockade. On the average the Japanese sink one of three of the blockade runners, but the prices obtained by the other two more than cover the loss of one vessel.

Three American firms have agents at Che Foo, who are doing a big business with the Russian consul. One San Francisco firm will send a junk to the competition after losing four junks successively. The others continue to accept commissions, but they have nearly doubled their prices since Nov. 1, owing to the continuous Japanese attack and the smaller chances of success. The Japanese have extended their patrol routes, but the blockade runners are still able to get in. The night work for nine months, and their effectiveness is thus lessened. The Chinese find it comparatively easy to slip past the blockading vessels at night.

ELEVATORS IN LINERS

New Boat To Be Five Storeys High and of Large Dimensions.

New York, Nov. 8.—The Hamburg-American line have announced novelties in the construction of their new monster ships. The Kaiserin, the Victoria, and the America, building respectively at the Vulcan works at Stettin and the yards of Harland & Wolff, Belfast.

Each of the liners will have a grill room of the proportions of a modern restaurant, and passengers may dine when they please and may arrange luncheon and dinner parties for friends whom they may meet on board. There will be no upper berths in the first cabin staterooms, which will be larger than those of the average big liner, some having the unusual dimension of 10 ft. by 12 ft.

There will be passenger elevators running through all the five storeys, or decks, where there are passenger accommodations. Turkish baths and a large gymnasium. There is no appreciable difference between the two ships except the length, beam and depth. The Kaiserin is the larger, being 705 feet long, of 77 feet beam, 52 feet 9 inches deep, and displacing about 10,000 tons, with a cargo capacity of 16,000 tons. She will carry 600 first cabin, 300 second cabin, 250 third class, and 2,350 steerage passengers.

Each ship will have three promenade decks, one of which will be reserved exclusively for promenading, while the others will be used for folks who want to take their evening strolls. The time of the ships between this port and Plymouth or Cherbourg will be, it is expected, about seven days and a half. The America will be in commission next August, and the Kaiserin in the spring of 1906.

AMBITION OF HARRIMAN

Making Efforts to Control All Transcontinental Lines.

New York, Nov. 8.—E. H. Harriman is said to have an ambition to control all transcontinental railroad lines with the exception of the Canadian Pacific, and his efforts in that direction may lead to some great railroad wars. The steps already taken by Mr. Harriman are outlined as follows:

The purchase of the Oregon Short Line and Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, giving Union Pacific a grip on the Oregon route.

The purchase of the Southern Pacific, carrying with it control of the Central Pacific.

The purchase and control of the Northern Pacific, causing the panic of May 9, 1901.

The purchase of a big block of Atchafalaya, giving Mr. Harriman an important place in the administration of this system.

The purchase of a half-interest in the San Pedro, Los Angeles and Pacific, giving Mr. Harriman a voice in six out of seven coast routes in American territory.

Mr. Harriman is still fighting in the courts for his tenure of Northern Pacific. One American railroad, the Great Northern, and one Canadian, the Canadian Pacific, have the ambition of Mr. Harriman. Both are beyond the power of his control, but J. J. Hill is on record as saying that Mr. Harriman is in control of the Northern Pacific could also own Great Northern at a price.

This ambition is being bitterly fought by all the other railway powers of the West—Hill, Gould and the Rock Island party—and also one of the reasons for the half dozen lines already projected west from Denver.

The Filipino and the young woman arose and departed, running a gauntlet of hissing from the time they started up the aisle until they disappeared at the rear of the house.

LONG SEARCH FOR A LOST BROTHER

Quest of Lady Semon Ends at the Tomb.

CANADIAN CITIES WERE VISITED

Brother's Grave Located in a Philadelphia Cemetery—Will Erect Handsome Mausoleum.

Philadelphia, Nov. 8.—After searching for many years for her brother and sister, Lady Semon, wife of Sir Felix Semon, who is a physician to King Edward, left here for New York, having, it is said, accomplished her mission, so far as it was possible.

With her husband she will sail this week for London after making provision for the erection of a handsome mausoleum over the body of her brother, who she discovered is lying in a grave in Laurel Hill Cemetery.

Lady Semon came to this city in September in search of her brother and sister, from whom she was separated in Germany 25 years ago. She was then Fraulein Reider, the eldest of three children. Her brother, Adolph, left home when a young man, came to America, for a while he maintained a correspondence with his sister, but eventually they lost track of him. Later Lady Semon's sister, married, and she is now grown to young womanhood.

Longing for bigger fields, he left his native village and went to London, where his meteoric rise and subsequent accession to knighthood is a matter of history.

His wife had always grieved for her brother and sister, and her unhappiness was such that her husband decided to forsake his practice for a few months to aid his wife in finding her relatives.

They reached Philadelphia after many wanderings and found that Adolph Reider was dead. His widow and son, however, were living at No. 2613 Columbia avenue.

Adolph Reider was buried in Laurel Hill Cemetery, and his sister immediately determined to erect a suitable monument over his grave. Before providing for this, however, she decided to search for her sister.

For more than a month Lady Semon and her husband have been traveling through Canada, stopping at towns of prominence and making inquiries, but unavailingly, and the search was finally abandoned and Sir Felix and his wife returned here.

PRAISE FOR MR. STRATTON

Premier Ross Speaks at Banquet to Public Servants.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—Hon. J. R. Stratton, Provincial Secretary, tendered a banquet in the Parliament buildings tonight to the superintendents of the public institutions and the heads of the various branches of his department. Premier Ross was present but none of the other cabinet ministers.

During the evening Mr. Stratton presented with a magnificent cabinet of silver, and made no reference to the political situation, other than to say that he believed the Government would be sustained in its record. He spoke in great praise of the men and women who had administered his department.

Mr. Stratton did not refer to his probable early retirement from Ontario politics. He said: "Whether my time be short or long, if you believe in the newspaper press, it may be short—but it may be longer than they say. Whether it be long or short, there is no feeling but that of the greatest kindness between the Premier and myself. It is not the wish of the Premier that it be short, and perhaps it is not my wish that it may be too long."

WATERSON'S SON LOST

Deserted His Wife and Goes to the Philippine Islands.

Lawton, Ok. T., Nov. 9.—Ewell Waterson, the son of the editor, Henry Waterson, of Kentucky, and for whom the county of Waterson was named, purchased by his father, where the son resided about a year, has deserted his wife and gone to parts unknown to her. He left her several months ago and has never returned.

They resided north of the town of Sterling in the northwestern part of the county, where young Waterson became well known. During the visit of Henry Waterson to the territory several months ago he visited his son and daughter-in-law and stayed several days with them.

It is reported that young Waterson lives on the Philippines. His wife still lives on the farm.

WORLD'S CRUELEST FATHER

Boy Tied by Hands to Rafter for Twelve Hours.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 9.—Theodore Ent, branded by his neighbors as the "cruelest father in the world," was indicted by the grand jury, and must stand trial for tying his 12-year-old son to a rafter in the garret for 12 hours with only his toes touching the floor. Neighbors cut the ropes. The boy, it is said, ran away, taking a dollar belonging to his father.

"The ropes cut my wrists and the ropes around my chest hurt me," said the boy. "He left me hanging there and went away, but he came back every half hour or so and tantalized me. I was sick. I cried. I begged him for a drink, because I was so thirsty."

"Please papa, give me a drink of water," I said, but he was mad and hit me with a lath."

SERVICE TO BRISTOL

To Be Only One Steamer in Three Weeks After This.

London, Nov. 8.—The C. P. R. and the Dominion Steamship Company have decided to run jointly between Bristol and Canada only sufficient steamers to give an arrival in three weeks. The Western Daily Press, in commenting, says it is a serious change to reduce the service from a time-table of weekly arrival to one of three weeks only. It is to be hoped the last word has not been said on the subject.

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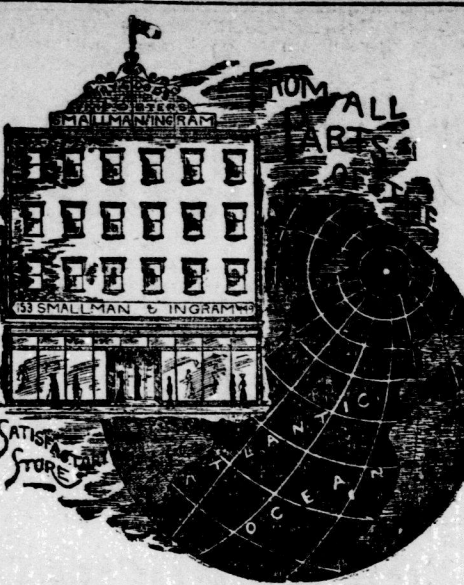
