Cape Town is pre-eminently suitable as the seat of government. It is the gateway of South Africa, and is associated in the minds of all "globetrotting" Britons with the wonderful and fascinating colony. Its Houses of Parliament, standing in the centre of the city, form a handsome architectural pile and will make an admirable Africa. The buildings are in the Renaissance style, and the central hall or lobby, a lofty apartment, is used as a throne room. It is a suggestive thought that some day a King of England may visit Cape Town and use this throne room for the opening of the Parliament of a united South Africa. In 1904 the population of Cape Town, excluding the suburbs, was 77,183, of which 43,694 were of European extrac tion, and 33,488 belonged to colored

A Beautiful City.

The "supreme court" has its sittings at Cape Town, but these will now be transferred to Bloemfontein, the former capital of the Orange River Free State, 750 miles from Cape Town. So far as natural beauty is concerned, it would make an ideal capital, and it has the advantage of a central situation. Highways converge towards it from all parts of the country, and handsome buildings fill its streets. According to the latest census, the population was 33,809, exclusive of about

Pretoria, the future headquarters of the civil service, is 1,040 miles from Cape Town. In the small hours of June 5, 1900, Pretoria surrendered un conditionally to Lord Roberts, who officially took possession of the town the same afternoon. It was the seat of the Boer administration, and the Government Buildings, erected at a cost of £200,000, form one of the handsomest and costliest piles in South Africa. The central tower i surmounted by a statute of Liberty which may now be taken as an emblem

of the new regime. The population of Pretoria was last returned at 36,700, and, like its sister capital cities, it is laid out in raral-lelograms, the streets being of equal width throughout and lined with magnificent willows. The town is lighted throughout by electricity, as well as any country in Europe, and large sums have been spent on roads and drainage. All three cities are well linked up by road and rail.
