

SOUTH AFRICA'S THREE CAPITALS

Cape Town, Pretoria and Bloemfontein Each Admirably Suited for Purpose Chosen.

Cape Town, South Africa, March 2.—The delicate and difficult problem of selecting a capital for a United South Africa has been settled by a happy and promising compromise, which probably would not have occurred to anyone outside the secret councils of the South African Union Convention. There are to be three capital cities.

Cape Town, the headquarters of the Legislature.

Pretoria for civil service or administration; and

Bloemfontein, for the judiciary.

This division of honors shows a wise statesmanship, for it aims at a reconciliation of contending claims which had something of racial prejudice behind them.

Cape Town is pre-eminently suitable as the seat of government. It is the gateway of South Africa, and is associated in the minds of the "white-trotting" Britons with the wonderful and fascinating colony. Its Houses of Parliament, standing in the centre of the city, form a handsome and imposing pile, and will make an admirable legislative chamber for a united South Africa. The buildings are in the hall of the Renaissance style, and the central hall or lobby, a lofty apartment, is used as a throne room. It is a suggestive thought that some day the king and queen may visit Cape Town and use this throne room for the opening of the Parliament of a united South Africa.

In 1904 the population of Cape Town, excluding the suburbs, was 77,182, of which 43,694 were of European extraction, and 33,488 belonged to colored races.

A Beautiful City.

The "supreme court" has its sittings at Cape Town, but these will now be transferred to Bloemfontein, the former capital of the Orange River Free State, 150 miles from Cape Town. So far as natural beauty is concerned, it would make an ideal capital, and it has the advantage of a central situation. Highways converge towards it from all parts of the country, and handsome buildings fill its streets. According to the latest census, the population was 33,699, exclusive of about 3,000 troops.

Pretoria, the future headquarters of the civil service, is 1,040 miles from Cape Town, and like its sister capital cities, is laid out in a regular plan. The streets are wide and straight, and the town is lighted throughout by electricity, and has any country in Europe, and large sums have been spent on roads and drainage. All these cities are well linked up by road and rail.

MARLBOROUGH'S AN UNHAPPY PAIR

Separation of Duke and Duchess Does Not Seem to Have Benefitted Either.

London, March 2.—There are again rumors in regard to the health of the duchess of Marlborough. When she paid a flying visit to Sunderland House the other day and a week-end visit to Brighton, her friends were shocked at her appearance.

Although looking pretty and wistful as ever, she was so fragile in appearance that, as her friends described it, "one might have blown her away with a breath." She has returned to St. Moritz, which is the only place where she seems to be happy or well. Her sister, Lady Mary, who is married to a little stronger, from all reports, but the physicians do not conceal the fact that she will never be able to live all the year in England with its winter fogs and damp.

Under these circumstances society people have almost despaired of that "white elephant," Sunderland House, ever being the scene of gorgeous hospitality. The great ball which has been talked of for a year is not likely to take place even this season, as the duchess appears to have lost interest in almost everything.

The Duke of Marlborough is almost as restless as his wife. He spends his time between Woodstock, the Ritz Hotel in London, and Paris, and appears far less than in former times at political meetings. He intends, however, to take some part in the Anti-Socialist Union.

BALDWIN LEFT \$30,000,000

His Estate the Largest Ever Probated in Southern California.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 2.—"Lucky" Baldwin's estate is worth \$30,000,000, according to a statement by his manager, A. H. Church.

This is the largest estate ever probated in Southern California. Knowing that there would be an attempt to break any will that he might make, Baldwin had his attorney, Bradner M. Lee, draw a document that would be sure to meet every possible legal requirement. It was executed several months ago, while the old man's mind was still perfectly clear. Attorney Lee declined to discuss the contents of the will.

He said, however, that the document provides for an equitable division of all property. From one who has seen the will, it is said that it allows Mrs. Baldwin more than would be hers under a court division, and provides for all the legal heirs.

VAST GAME PRESERVE

Million Acres May Be Set Aside in Rainy River District.

Toronto, March 2.—A million acres of land will likely be set aside in the Rainy River district as a forest and game preserve.

W. A. Preston, M. P., and Arthur H. Hays, Canadian Northern agent, interviewed Hon. Frank Cochrane and Hon. Dr. Reame today on the subject and received favorable replies.

Mr. Hays, who has just returned from St. Paul, brought word that Minnesota was setting aside a million acres of land known as the Quicoque country. This will make a vast preserve of 2,000,000 acres, in the administration of which the Governments of Ontario and Minnesota will co-operate.

THE RAILWAY UPHELD

Stratford Man Loses in Damage Suit Against Grand Trunk.

Toronto, March 2.—In June, 1907, Frederick Clegg, of Stratford, shipped some household goods per G. T. R. for Ogden, Utah. These goods have never been heard of since. Clegg brought suit against the company, but the local judge dismissed the action, on the ground that two other railways, both United States concerns, must be made parties thereto.

This decision was upheld by Justice Anglin. In the chambers this morning Clegg moved for leave to appeal, but Chief Justice Meredith refused to grant it, and upheld the decision of the local judge and Judge Anglin.

Clegg asked for \$38 damages and \$500, the value of the goods.

NEITHER WOULD TALK

Dr. Garman and Rev. Mr. Jackson Refuse to Make Statements.

Toronto, March 2.—Dr. Garman has returned from Smith's Falls and refuses to talk. Dr. Jackson is likewise silent. When interviewed at his office at the Methodist headquarters today the former gave irrelevant answers, making it clear that he did not wish to say anything which could be published as an opinion in the controversy. He succeeded in his object.

As the Rev. Mr. Jackson's house the press was told that Rev. Mr. Jackson could not see anybody.

In short, silence has fallen on the two divines, neither now apparently desiring to add new fuel to the controversial fire which is blazing in the church.

TO ARREST CASTRO.

Caracas, Venezuela, March 1 (via Willemstad). Caracas, March 2.—Should Spiriano Castro, former president of the republic, attempt to return to the country he will face the possibility of arrest by the Government the moment he disembarks, because he has been criminally indicted in the federal court on the charge of having conspired to effect the assassination of Juan Vincent Gomez, the present president.

In consequence of this contingency the report that Castro purposes to embark at Bordeaux on March 28 for La Guaira has been received here with much interest. It is feared that Castro's presence in Venezuela would be dangerous demonstrations against him, which the police and troops would have much difficulty in putting down.

It is thought that Castro may go first to Nicaragua because of his strong friendship with President Zelaya, of that republic.

SMITH IS SATISFIED

Swings the United States Senate to His Views as Regards the Waterways Treaty.

Washington, March 2.—The conferees on the river and harbor bill agreed today on all features, including the Soo rapids and all the Soo people and Senator Smith are satisfied.

The section regarding the leasing of the power in the rapids was rewritten. While its general purpose is not changed, the discretion of the Secretary of War as to rates for the use of water, or whether he shall lease them or not, is made absolute. The extraordinary feature of the Smith amendment was thus stricken out.

The interests of navigation are declared paramount. If these interests are interfered with in any way, the secretary need not permit power development, and no lease or license of water to the Michigan Lake Superior Company. The control of the Government in the rapids is made absolute forever, and no lease or license of power, is to be for more than 30 years, and all leases are to be subject to revision by the Secretary of War.

Senator Smith now anticipates that the Canadian conservation treaty will be ratified tomorrow with such conditions attached as will meet his wishes. For the Soo, word is expected from Great Britain indicating whether that country will consent to Senator Smith's proposed change of new vessels. But if no word is received Senator Smith's expectation is that the Senate will go ahead, leaving Great Britain later to take such action as it sees fit.

RULES OF POKER GAME

Court Will Not Permit It in Defense of Oliver.

Toronto, March 2.—Chief Justice Meredith this morning ordered two paragraphs to be struck out of the statements of the defense in the case of H. S. Clements, of Chatham, against Dr. Oliver, in which a letter for damages for alleged slander, arising out of the recent general elections. The paragraphs ordered to be struck out have related to an alleged poker game. The chief justice holds that these references are only incidental, that the gravamen of the charges is the alleged theft of money, and that the matter stated in the paragraphs should not be brought out in the way of justification, but only in mitigation of damages, if any are given.

"It's a trick pleading," remarked the chief justice.

"We deny having made the statement we are charged with having made," returned counsel for the defendant. "And we say that if we did make it we were justified because it was true."

The libel alleged was that Dr. Oliver, and Clements, were getting away with \$34 that was "in the pot" at a poker game when an alarm of "Police" was raised.

His lordship refused to believe the charge of having been a member of a poker club was the real purport of the words objected to.

"The gravamen of the charge is that this man stole the money," declared Sir William.

Mr. Ferguson, for the defense, urged that it might be the matter of importance to some of the electors if this man played poker.

"If he played poker and fifty different games, it is no concern of mine," he said. "The charge is that he stole the money," remarked Sir William.

C. Robinson, for the plaintiff, argued that the paragraphs complained of were not pleadable at all.

"Sir William did not agree with him. A man can't prove up to the hilt everything," declared the chief justice, "but if he can prove nine-tenths of it, why should he not be allowed to do it?"

BOURASSA WITH CONS.

Takes His Place on the Opposition Side of Quebec Legislature.

Quebec, March 2.—Mr. J. M. Teller, M. L. A. for Joliette, was chosen leader of the Opposition at a caucus of the Opposition members, held at the parliament buildings today. It was resolved that the Conservative and the Nationalist parties would work together to oppose the Government. The Opposition will ask for rearrangement of seats, placing Mr. Bourassa at the same desk with Mr. Teller.

Mr. A. Laverne, M. L. A. for Montmagny, has already 25 notices of motion and questions on the order paper concerning the Abitibi affair, the colonization, lands, mines and fisheries and public utilities.

JACK JOHNSON'S PLANS.

Honolulu, March 2.—Jack Johnson, the champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, arrived here today on the steamship Makura, from Australia. He will give an exhibition here tomorrow, after which he will depart for Vancouver. From Vancouver he will go to Chicago. From then to his home in Galveston. After a brief visit there he will go to New York and to London, where he has a series of music hall engagements. The conqueror of Tommy Burns, who arrived here that he stands ready to fight any man for a purse and a side bet of \$5,000. Johnson says that he was badly treated at Sydney. He complains that the Australians are bad losers, but says that he was well received in the music halls of Melbourne, Perth, Kalgoorlie and Adelaide on the tour which he made just before sailing for home.

SACKVILLE-WEST ESTATE

Several Claimants to Property of Former British Ambassador.

Madrid, March 2.—The case of Ernest Henri Battiste West, claimant to the Sackville West estate, against Lionel Edward Sackville-West, to whom the estates have passed, opened in this city today. The case hinges upon the legitimacy of the claimant, and this he will try to prove in court.

Another claimant to the estates has appeared at Grenada. This man declares that he can prove his claim by documents received from the late Lord Sackville.

The late Lord Sackville, uncle of the present successor of the estates, was British minister to Washington in 1888. Ernest West is the natural son of Lord Sackville, who, while he was in Madrid, formed an irregular alliance with a Spanish dancer named Josephine Duran de Ortega, and his claim to the title and estate has aroused a great degree of sentimental interest.

No attempt is made to deny that Lord Sackville lived with Josephine de Ortega as his wife, and that he formally legitimized his children by her, but Lionel will contend that the dancer in 1881, fifteen years prior to the birth of Ernest, contracted a marriage with a Spanish named Olivia, and that consequently Lord Sackville's legal recognition of his children is nullified.

The present case is a criminal action against a church employee named Rolan, a relative of Josephine, and a third man, who was charged with altering the records of the marriage of Josephine to Olivia in the interests of the claimant.

Rolan in his testimony insisted that he was never hired by another person to falsify the records. Rolan made the counter-charge that he was a letter in which it was stated that witnesses at the previous trial received a thousand dollars from Lionel Sackville. West agreed in return for supporting Lionel's side of the case.

The testimony of the handwriting experts agreed on the impossibility of identifying the handwriting as either of the accused men in the entries in the church record.

FAMOUS LIBRARY ROBBED.

London, March 2.—The library of Lincoln's Inn, which has been used for 500 years by judges and barristers for purposes of research, has been looted and spoiled of some dozen of its greatest treasures, dating from the 15th and 16th centuries. The loss has only just been discovered. It is believed that the pilfering has been going on for a year past.

ARCHDUKE FOR OTTAWA.

Ottawa, March 2.—Archduke John of Austria, nephew of the Emperor of Austria, who with the grand duchess has come for New York, is expected to visit Ottawa.
