By a decision of the referees named to go into the matter of damages, and which has never been, it is understood, disputed by either side, it is laid down that not until such time as the splash boards are placed to a height of 3 feet 10 inches over the crest of the dam. will the water back up so as to afect the plaintiff's mill race.
