Towns Are Menaced By Forest Fires

St. John, N. B., July 16.—As a result of forest fires which are now making rapid progress and cannot be controlled the villages of Back Bay, L'Etang, Letete and Mascene are completely cut off from St. George. The fire has been raging fiercely for the past 48 hours with no possibility of its diminishing. Communication can only be had with the villages from St. Georges by driving around 40 miles. Telephone and telegraph lines are down and the residents are waiting and praying for rain that is expected to bring relief. The entire neighborhood have turned out en masse to fight the flames, but despite their utmost efforts the fires are making rapid progress and are ultimately result in total destruction of the villages. The men are resorting to cutting down large strips of timber and digging canals and ditches in their efforts to check the onward sweep of the flames. The dying down of the winds for a short time did not seem to visibly check the fire. At South Bay the fire has already swept over 3,000 acres and there appears a remote possibility of confining it unless rain sets in at once.

Barbadoes' Preferential Treatment

Bridgetown, Barbadoes, Monday, July 6.—The Barbadoes Legislature has passed a law giving Canada preferential treatment of 20 per cent on flour, cheese, cordage, butter, hay, oats, peas, fish, lumber (other than pitch pine), bacon, hams, iron and steel nails, spikes, rivets and clinches, shingles, bran, sulphate of ammonia and mixed manure, soap, beans, horses, boots and shoes, fish and meat canned in iron or steel bars, hoops and rods, on condition that the Canadian preference is altered so as to leave a clear \$3.72 per ton in favor of the Indian sugar, as against sugars from foreign countries. Canada's trade with Barbadoes is only 7 1/2 per cent. America has 40 per cent, and Great Britain 45 per cent. The new tariff tends to goods from all British countries, and will benefit Great Britain at the expense of the American manufacturer as much if not more than Canada.

**GRAND LODGE
TO MEET HERE**

The Forest City Chosen by the Convention by a Great Majority.

Niagara Falls, July 16.—The Grand Lodge of Ontario, A. F. and A. M., closed here this afternoon. The final report of the credential committee showed 401 lodges on the register, of which 320 were represented in grand lodge and 81 unrepresented. The registered delegates numbered 779, representing a vote of 1,438. The installation of the newly-elected district deputy grand masters was conducted by Past Grand Masters A. A. Stevenson and Past Grand Master E. T. Malone.

London was chosen as the next place of meeting. The vote was: London 754, and Toronto 197. The announcement was received with loud applause.

The report of the scrutineers declared Grand Master A. T. Freed and Deputy Grand Master D. F. MacWatt, with Grand Treasurer E. T. Malone, duly elected by acclamation. E. E. Fraser, Niagara Falls, was elected grand senior warden on the second ballot.

J. C. Bartram, Ottawa, was elected grand junior warden on 551 votes, L. H. Luke, of Toronto, the next man, polling 333. G. W. Clendenen, West Toronto, secured 81.

Rev. Frank Harper, Barrie, was elected grand chaplain on the second ballot.

R. L. Gunn, of Hamilton, was elected grand secretary.

D. Rutherford, of Owen Sound, was elected grand registrar.

The following were elected members of the board of general purposes: Young, of North Bay; Luke, of Ottawa; W. D. McPherson, of Toronto; and John Hoodless, of Hamilton. Hoodless headed the poll.

The following five members were appointed to the board by the grand master: W. Geo. Eakins, Toronto; Fred Harcourt, Toronto; W. Rea, Ottawa; J. Cornell, of Sarnia; P. W. D. Broderick, London.

R. W. Bro. Aubrey White, of Toronto, is vice-president of the board of general purposes.

A WIN FOR LABOR

Sheet Metal Workers Granted New Trial by Privy Council.

Toronto, July 16.—The firm of Lee & O'Donohue this morning received a cable from Mr. J. G. O'Donohue, who is at present in London, stating that the privy council had granted the appeal of Jose, et al., and the International Union of Sheet Metal Workers against the judgment of the court here for \$7,500 in favor of the Metallic Roofing Company.

This action, which was commenced in 1902, is of great interest to trades unionists. The member of local union No. 30, left the works of the company because it would not sign an agreement with the union. The company brought an action for \$20,000 damages against the officers of the union, and also the international body as an organization. They also asked for a perpetual injunction against "picketing" and interfering with their business. Mr. Justice MacMahon and a special jury gave the company judgment for \$7,500 and granted the injunction. The divisional court upheld the judgment. The court of appeal upheld the part referring to the amount of damages, but found no picketing, and consequently struck the injunction out as regards the union. The privy council now grants the appeal and orders a new trial on the ground of misdirection at the trial, so that the whole matter will either have to be gone into again ab initio or dropped. The case was argued by Sir Rufus Isaacs, K.C., and Mr. J. G. O'Donohue.

CAUGHT IN THE SHAFTING.

Rochester, July 17.—Caught by both arms in the rapidly-revolving wheels of the line shafting in the Lawless Paper Company's mill in Penfield, Spence Bushnell, 37 years old, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon. Bushnell had worked in the mill since he was a lad of 9 years of age. He noticed a leak in one of the pipes near some line shafting and was shifting the cloth bag into the leak when it was caught around the nearby shaft. Before he could let go his arms were drawn into the wheels and his head was jerked violently against the machinery. His head was crushed and the force of the revolving wheels took off the right arm at the elbow and mangled the other arm.

**'BOBS' AND OTHERS
REACH QUEBEC**

Party of Distinguished Englishmen Arrive to Take Part in the Celebration.

Quebec, July 17.—Lord Roberts, the Duke of Norfolk and Lord Loyal arrived here tonight on the Empress of Ireland.

The United States warship New Hampshire passed Rimouski tonight, en route for Quebec. The first regular presentation of the pageants will be given on Tuesday, July 21, another on Friday, July 24, to be followed by a state presentation on Saturday, July 25, when His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the vice-president of the United States and the representatives of France and other nations, the descendants of Wolfe and Montcalm, and other distinguished personages, will officially attend. The pageants will also be given on the Monday, Wednesday and Friday of the following week, the other days being taken up with military and naval manoeuvres, displays of fireworks and other interesting events. Quebec's past glories, as reproduced by the pageants, will make a series of brilliant spectacles that will last long in the memory of those who witness them.

and the city would have to pay him what he asked.

As Mr. Saunby had not entered his claim within the time specified, it was argued that it was outlaid.

There was another act of a general nature, however, which expressed the opinion that existing water powers should not be interfered with, but the opinion of Messrs. Aylesworth and Meredith was that this did not conflict with the London Waterworks act.

The Case in the Courts.

The case was first tried at London, and the plaintiff won, the sum of \$500. The only offer ever made was that of \$38,000.

It was said today that either side may appeal from the decision of Judge Finkle, but as yet there has been no talk of appeal.

Mr. Ivey stated to The Advertiser that he would have nothing to say for some days.

The Question of Damages.

By a decision of the referees named to go into the matter of damages, and which has never been, it is understood, disputed by either side, it is laid down that not until such time as the splashboards are placed to a height of 3 feet 10 inches over the crest of the dam, will the water back up so as to affect the plaintiff's mill race.

The city has been keeping the boards at a height of 3 feet 3 inches, and it is claimed that this is all that is necessary to run the pumps.

Thus, according to statements made to The Advertiser, the dam is to remain where it is, and so long as the splashboards are not higher than 3 feet 10 inches, the plaintiff cannot claim he is being damaged.

How It Is Done.

In his decision Mr. Justice Finkle is guided by the instructions of the privy council, which laid down the view that Mr. Saunby was entitled to costs for a period of six years before the entering of the action, or back until 1891, as well as for every year since that time.

In his award, the judge sets out so much damages for each year, until the final sum of \$2,140 is reached.

Montreal, July 16.—That rich iron deposits have been discovered within 100 miles of Montreal was the statement made by a prominent C. P. R. official this morning. He refused to give the exact location of the discovery, but said he was going to look over the ground himself. He declared that the deposits were practicable and workable, and said they would mean the opening of an immense iron and steel industry here.
