Ex-Ald. Gerry Denies That Any Committee of Citizens Were Associated With Mr. Beck in the Wells Scheme.

Mr. Gerry, in his statement denies that there was any committee of citiens associated with Hon, Adam Beck the artesian well project. He also the artesian well project the artesian well project. His pleadings are as follows:

1. Plaintiff denies that any committee of citizens were associated with Hon. Adam Beck in sinking wells upon plaintiff spremises or elsewhere. Plaintiff denies that Hon. Adam Beck sunk any wells at his own risk, but on the contrary says that he was secured by a guarantee from the persons who sunk the wells, and that he took no risk whatever himself.

2. Plaintiff denies that he gave any consent to any committee of citizens to sink wells upon the lands of the plaintiff.

3. Denies that any committee of citizens had anything to do whatever in law, or in fact with the bylaws, necessary to the completion of the scheme passed by the city council.

4. Plaintiff states that the water

4. Plaintiff states that the water commissioners appointed H. J. Glaubitz as engineer to pass upon and accept as to cost and workmanship, the whole works, machinery and plant purchased from Hon. Adam Beck, well knowing that H. J. Glaubitz was Hon. Adam Heck's engineer in charge of the work, and, therefore, passing on his own work, he would in no sense be an independent or outside engineer in a fair position to act independently between the water commissioners and Hon. Adam Heck.

6. Plaintiff denies that Hon. Adam Beck has ever tried to make any reasonable arrangement or that he has ever offered to pay any reasonable price for the lands and water sought to be expropriated by the proceedings which this action seeks to restrain.

8. Plaintiff says that the water commissioners have no power under the London waterworks act of 1873, and amending acts, to take such proceedings to expropriate lands.
