SPEAKER WARREN WAS DEFEATED BY GRIMES

Opposition Candidate Made Important Gain in Newfoundland General Election.

[Canadian Press.]

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 31.—Speaker Warren, of the House of Assembly, was defeated in the quadrennial general election yesterday by Business Manager Grimes, of the Fishermen's Protective Union, allied with the Opposition party headed by Sir Robert Bond.

The vote was: Grimes 571, Warren 687. Mr. Grimes will represent the Port de Grave district, the only one in which the count of ballots had been completed this morning. He is a Socialist.

The Fishermen's Protective Union, a labor organization formed since the last general election, has reached large proportion. It was at first planned to have the union attempt at a third party to capture the balance of power in the House. Later the union formed a coalition with the Bond party, which accepted several of the labor men as its candidates.

WOE IN HAMILTON; BEANS GOING UP

Increase in Favorite Commodity of Mountaineers Causes Alarm.

Down in Hamilton they are bemoaning, among other evidences of the high cost of living, an advance in the retail price of beans. Ordinary plain white garden beans cost 10 cents a pound. Beans wholesale in Hamilton at \$1.75 to \$2 a bushel, but they cost the consumer who buys them 10 cents a pound, or \$8 a bushel. Intellectual and cultured Hamiltonians who have grown up on B. B. E.'s are in a quandary as to what substitute for their historic brain food they will find. Alfalfa is being sold here at \$1.40 to \$1.75 a bushel, but reports of the Kent crop being a failure indicate that advances may be looked for.

When he left his parents in England he was with the promise that he would bring them to Canada as soon as he was in a position to do so.
