

NORTH PERTH WILL BE REDEEMED, SAY LIBERAL DELEGATES

F. Wellington Hay Chosen to
Contest Seat.

CONSERVATIVES SCARED

Fear Success of Liberal Cam-
paign Against Govern-
ment Extravagance.

MILVERTON, June 23.—North
Perth will be redeemed for the Lib-
erals, and on July 1 a supporter of
N. W. Rowell will be returned to the
Ontario Legislature. This was the re-
assuring message brought by delegates
from all parts of the riding to the Lib-
eral convention, which today unanim-
ously nominated F. Wellington Hay of
Listowel as the candidate to fill the
vacancy caused by the resignation of
James Torrance.

The meeting was one of the largest
ever held in the riding, and the feeling
was of the best. The Conservative ma-
chine has been arguing for acclamation
for the Government candidate, but
there was no thought of that at to-
day's meetings. Every one of the 400
delegates was full of hopeful enthusi-
asm. While regretting that the Con-
servatives had thrown the seat open
at this time, all were determined to
carry on a strenuous campaign, and
are confident of winning.

Extravagance Issue.
Fair-minded Conservatives have
themselves admitted that the respon-
sibility of the hopelessness of the Gov-
ernment cause. The reckless extrava-
gance of the Government, and not bi-
lingualism or temperance, will be the
issue on which the contest will be
fought.

Other nominees were: R. S. Robert-
son, Dr. J. P. Rankin, ex-M.P.; John
Brown, ex-M.P.; George McLagan,
Thomas Ballantyne, J. A. Gray, Dr. L.
Robertson and Dr. Quinlan, all of
Stratford; Robert Armstrong, Elliot;
A. E. Malcolm, Listowel; J. G. Cronch,
Milverton; J. A. Hacking, Listowel;
John Davidson, Mornington, and Geo.
Drey, Listowel.

"The issue is clear-cut and will be
based on the extravagance and gen-
eral lack of foresight of the Govern-
ment," said Mr. Hay, in accepting the
nomination. "Bilingualism, temperance
and other questions have been raised
to avoid the real issue." He declared
himself absolutely in accord with the
policy of Mr. Rowell.

No Professional.
Mr. Hay came out strongly for a
fair and clean election. "If I am elected
I am not going to be an office-seeker,"
he declared. "I will give liberally of my
time, but I will not give twelve months.
If I did, I should become a profes-
sional politician, who should be de-
spised by everyone in the country."

Referring to the argument of Con-
servatives that the riding should go to
the Government candidate by acclama-
tion, Mr. Hay was very pronounced in
his opposition to any such measure.
Had the vacancy resulted from the
death of a member, or some other such
unforeseen cause, he believed the Lib-
erals big enough to consider such a
suggestion. But when the Government
had deliberately opened the riding he
was for a contest every time.

Mr. Hay went to Stratford tonight
and met local Liberals, organizing for
the campaign.

PETROGRAD REPORTS GERMAN OFFENSIVE HAS NO SUCCESS

Reinforcements Brought From
French and Italian Fronts.

CAPTURE THREE VILLAGES

Fighting With Germans in
Progress Along the Oginski
Canal, Near Pinsk.

PETROGRAD, June 23.—Via Lon-
don, 8:10 p.m.—The Russian forces
which are cutting their way through
Bukovina in an effort to capture the
Austrian army there, have made fur-
ther advances. The war office today
announced the capture of three vil-
lages west of Redatz, thirty miles
south of Czernowitz, the occupation of
which was reported yesterday. Eight
hundred prisoners were taken.

Three Villages Taken.
The villages near Redatz captured
by the Russians are Gurahumora,
Strailza and Sarach. The Russians
also have taken Vinitz, near Kutu.
Efforts of the Germans to advance
along the northern sector met with no
success, the announcement says. It
follows:

"In several sectors south of Dvinsk
the Germans, after preliminary prepa-
ration, endeavored to assume the off-
ensive. They were unsuccessful every-
where.

"Over all the front occupied by the
army of Gen. Brusilov and especially
at Radziviloff, the enemy continues to
receive reinforcements from the
French and Italian fronts.

"Our offensive in Bukovina contin-
ues. We occupied the village of
Gurahumora, Strailza and Sarach.
West of Radatz, and Vinitz near
Kutu. Eight hundred prisoners were
taken.

Heavy Fighting With Germans.
"At 11 o'clock on Wednesday night
an engagement began along the line in
the Oginski Canal region at Logishin.
The fighting was still in progress on
Thursday evening. Many attempts to
cross the canal by locks and fords
failed. In the course of the fighting,
the gallant General Stegmann was
wounded, and Colonel Berghemstroel
died from wounds he had received.

"Enemy aircraft dropped bombs on
the Molodchyn station yesterday.

"Caucasus front: The situation is
unchanged."

AUSTRIAN REPORT.
VIENNA, June 23.—Via London,
June 24, 2:15 a.m.—The following of-
ficial communication was issued to-
day:

"The Russians are advancing to-
ward Kutu. Otherwise there is no
change in the situation in Bukovina.
In East Galicia severe enemy at-
tacks in the region of Radziviloff were
everywhere repulsed.

"The Russians were pushed back
northeast of Gorochow and east of
Lokatski (southeast of Vladimir-
sk). The enemy's counter-attacks
in the vicinity of the Stokhod
and Styryk rivers failed.

"A squadron of seaplanes attacked
Venice Friday morning and dropped
bombs on Porto Niccol and Alberoni,
the gas works and the arsenal."

No More Kilts To Be Worn By Overseas Men

Department of Militia Finds
They Are Not Suitable for
Hardships of Trenches.

OTTAWA, June 23.—The militia
department has decided that no more
kilts will be issued to Scottish regiments
of the Canadian overseas forces.
Units which have the kilts now will
have to wear "trews" when their pre-
sent clothing is worn out. The kilts
will be to be the only exceptions in
the order just issued by the militia
council. However, Scottish corps will be
allowed to wear their kilts instead of
the regulation staff pattern caps as a
distinguishing mark. It has been found
that the kilts are not suitable for trench
work in rainy and cold weather, and
have caused considerable inconvenience.
Active militia regiments will not be af-
fected by the order.

RUSSIAN FORCES ON WAY INTO MESAPOTAMIA

Constantinople Says They Were Driven
Out of Pass.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 23.—(Via
London, 8:55 p.m.)—Russian forces
which were attempting to enter the
Mesopotamian plains through one of the
passes on the Persian frontier, have
been driven out of the pass to the east-
ward by Turkish troops, the war office
announced today.

The official statement is as follows:
"Mesopotamian front: The situation is
unchanged. Attacks by our troops re-
sulted in the Russians who were in
Paltak pass being driven out in the
direction of Kerind. Paltak pass lies
80 kilometres east of Kaan-i-Shirin, in
a hilly country. On June 18, north of
Kerind, Persian forces routed Russian
cavalry.

"Caucasus front: In the centre, we
brought down an enemy aeroplane."

MAJOR-GENERAL FRY COMMANDING IN IRELAND

Temporarily Appointed to Succeed
Major-General Friend.

LONDON, June 23.—10:37 p.m.—The
official gazette announces that Major-
Gen. Lovick B. Friend, who was in
command of the forces in Ireland during
the Sinn Reih rising until the
appointment of Gen. Sir John G. Mac-
well, has been superseded in the Irish
command by the temporary appoint-
ment of Major-Gen. William Fry.

LESS RIGID TESTS FOR FORESTRY BATTALIONS

Age Limit Raised to 45 and Eyesight
Requirements Reduced.

NIAGARA ON THE LAKE, Ont.,
June 23.—Recruits for men who
desire to enlist in the forestry battalions
are to be relaxed in the case of laborers
to include men to 45 years who may
have lost a finger on either or both
hands, or one or two toes, providing the
lost digits are not great toes or thumbs.
The test of eyes is also to be reduced.

Getting Together-- REV. DR. DICKIE IS MEMBER OF OLD CANADIAN FAMILY

The opening in Chatham of a new
club, under the auspices of Holy Trinity
Church, but with the co-operation and
support of all the churches, and for the
benefit of the people in the whole
city, has set men thinking on great
advantages of people getting together
in life. Isolation or independence was
the dominant characteristic of the Vic-
torian era, but with the crowning of
Victoria's great son, Edward VII., the
Peacemaker, a new era opened having
as its characteristic note, co-operation
or interdependence. No longer do we
hear any great British statesman speak-
ing of the "splendid isolation" of his
country, as used to be the case, but
today Britain gladly allies herself with
other nations and peoples. Each
leader and her last man in co-operation
with them to win the fight for free-
dom, democracy and Christianity.

Now, the law of interdependence is
everywhere in operation in human so-
ciety, and the supreme need of the hour
is for us to recognize it, and act upon
it by co-operating heartily with others.
Let me show this by a glance at three
great spheres of life.

In Business Life. In all the ramifi-
cations of the commercial world we
find no absolute independence. Each
business man, whether he be a farmer,
or a manufacturer, or a merchant, or
a banker, or a professional man, or
a laborer, is dependent on the others
for assistance. Farmers often fancy
they can be independent not only of the
business and professional men, but of
the town and city, but as well of one an-
other. It is a huge mistake. The crying
need of farmers in this country today
is more co-operation among themselves
as well as with the men of the towns
and cities. In this way can the great
problems of demand and supply,
agricultural efficiency, adequate rural
population, better country schools and
churches, better roads and the like, be
solved. The businessmen of the city
have learned the value of co-operation,
and practice it more fully than the farm-
ers. So do the trades and professions
through their unions and associations,
but if there were more getting together
of all classes and conditions in our
towns and cities and rural communities
vastly more might be done to make
business profitable and pleasant.

In Social Life. The same thing is true in social life.
If we want to make an individual mem-
berable, we have only to make him mem-
berable, and it matters not whether he is
confined to a palace or a cottage or a
dugout, as long as he is isolated from the
rest of mankind. This is what makes
life so trying in the newer parts of our
great Dominion, where settlement
is so recent, and where the pioneer has
to go miles to visit his nearest neighbor.
Anyone living in Kent County, or in
any part of old Ontario, for that mat-
ter, where there is not only a soil of
remarkable fertility, but a fine class of
people to associate with and to rear
one's children among, should be slow
to emigrate to the west. Intensive far-
ming, however, would vastly increase the
present population of Kent and other
counties, and make life on its social
side as rich and as varied as the soil.
The advantages of getting together
for this end are so obvious that
further words are unnecessary.

Morals and Religion. Then, lastly, what is true in industry
and social affairs, is true in morals
and religion. We cannot stand alone
and be happy and be useful. We are

which bodes ill, under the blessing of
God, for any one who would destroy us.
Great National Church. When we think of the advantages
that would accrue from a great national
church in this country—advantages
such as freeing the ministers from sec-
tarianism, the welfare of the denomina-
tion rather than the Kingdom of God,
drawing Christians together in their
religious life, and so enriching their
interests, securing a uniformly well-
educated and highly disciplined min-
istry, guaranteeing a policy of religious
education that would have greater pow-
er in purifying the atmosphere of the
country, riding the recent political
evils, and moulding all races and
tribes into one common Canadianism,
and finally an economizing of men and
means, so that the better church and
better evangelized—I say, when one
thinks on these things, can he fail to
wonder and to be amazed that it is a
commonplace saying that after the war
we will be in a new world, where we
will be prepared to do new things on
a new scale. If, then, we can only get
together in this matter and reorganize
our religious forces in the presence of
the new need and the new opportunity,
surely a new Canada, greater than has
been, will be the result.

Commissioner of Agriculture
Victim of Heart-Failure.

GOING TO MEET WIFE

Former Deputy Minister in
Ontario and Progressive
in Agriculture.

ST. CATHARINES, June 23.—Pro-
fessor James, Dominion commissioner
of agriculture, died suddenly this even-
ing, while travelling unaccompanied on
an electric car running between here
and Niagara-on-the-Lake.

Professor James had come from
Toronto today, and had taken the 6
o'clock car for Niagara-on-the-Lake
to join his wife there, and to meet his
son, who is an officer at Niagara camp.
Shortly after leaving here a soldier
on the car observed that the motherless
body of the passenger, and informed
the conductor, who stopped the car,
and had Mr. James removed to the
freight office of the company on Clark
street. A doctor was called and pro-
nounced him dead of heart-failure.
Coroner Greenwood immediately ordered
removal of the body, which was
identified by documents in his pos-
session.
