EMPLOYMENT IS NOW IMPROVING

Ottawa, March 20 .- (By the Canadian Press.)-Employment is improving. At the beginning of February, according to returns which will shortly be issued by the labor department the percentage of unemployment in Canada among members of trade unions stood at 13.9 sa compared with 15.1 at the beginning of January and with 13.1 at the beginning of February, 1920. According to reports received from over six thousand employers, employment registered expansion during February as compared with January, but the situation was still somewhat less favorable than during 24½ responding period of last year.

FAMILY BUDGET FIGURE DECLINES

Ottawa, March 20.-(By Canadian Press) .- The average cost of a weekly 291/2 family budget of 29 staple foods in some sixty Canadian cities was \$10.60 at the beginning of February as compared with \$11.03 in January and \$13.08 in February, 1921.
